Fall Transplanting of Trees.

As a general rule it is better to transplant shade and fruit trees in the fall than to wait till spring. One reason is that the rainfall during the winter is needed to give the trees a good start, the soil becoming firmly packed about the roots and the trees will start off growing vigorously in warm spring weather. When set in spring the summer drought is apt to begin before trees have "taken hold" of the soil and will then suffer from drought and heat and lose foliage before summer is past. Fall planting is surest and best.

Orchards and fields are greatly benefited by a cover crop of oats, rye, emmer, burr clover, crimson clover, or even rape and turnips, provided the winter's

growth is plowed under in the spring.

This adds humus and moisture holding properties to the soil, liberates and makes plant food available for the early summer growth of the trees, and will repay the planter many times over the cost of work. This applies equally well to corn and cotton land, as well as to orchards.
