Unjust to Printers.

The postoffice in the little town of Falfurrias, in Brooks county, sells annually 40,000 stamped envelopes containing the address of the sender, according to Falfurrias Facts, an estimate which is probably quite conservative. These envelopes are printed by the Postoffice Department and are sold in competition with printed stationery supplied by the job printing offices of the country.

By using the same form for all such printing with no change except in the name and postoffice address, which, by the way is about all that is printed by the Government, except the fine reading "Return to," these envelopes are supplied at a price somewhat less than the job printing offices can furnish them for, and millions have been sold throughout the country each year. Just why the Government should single out the printing business to compete with it is not easy to understand. It is claimed that the object in beginning this business was to provide against a great mass of letters which go annually to the Dead Letter Office, because improperly directed and with no way of ascertaining to whom they should be returned. The greater part of the printed envelopes sold by the Postoffice Department are to those who would use printed envelopes anyhow, so it is contended that the policy of the Government serves only to take business away from the home printing offices.

A very great majority of what are known as country newspapers have job departments in connection with their newspapers, and in most of these the job printing is more remunerative than the newspaper business—in some, in fact, the newspapers could not exist without the patronage of the job department. Hence the protest that the Government has no more business printing envelopes in competition with individual enterprises than it has making kid gloves, dill pickles or chewing gum to sell at the postoffices along with postage stamps.—San Antonio Express
