

MAY SELL FROM CARS

State Railroad Commission Refuses to Issue Orders to Stop the Practice.

Austin, Nov. 11.—The Railroad Commission today refused the petition of the Retail Merchants and Jobbers' Association of Texas as for a hearing to consider the proposition of adopting a rule prohibiting fruits and vegetables being retailed from railroad freight cars. The commission holds that it is a fight between retailers over which it has no jurisdiction and declines to take any part in it.

Coincident with its decision a committee of three apple peddlers, those who ship apples in car lots and sell the fruit from the cars, appeared before the commission and related their side of the controversy. They intimated that certain railroads had given them to understand that the commission had written a decision in their favor.

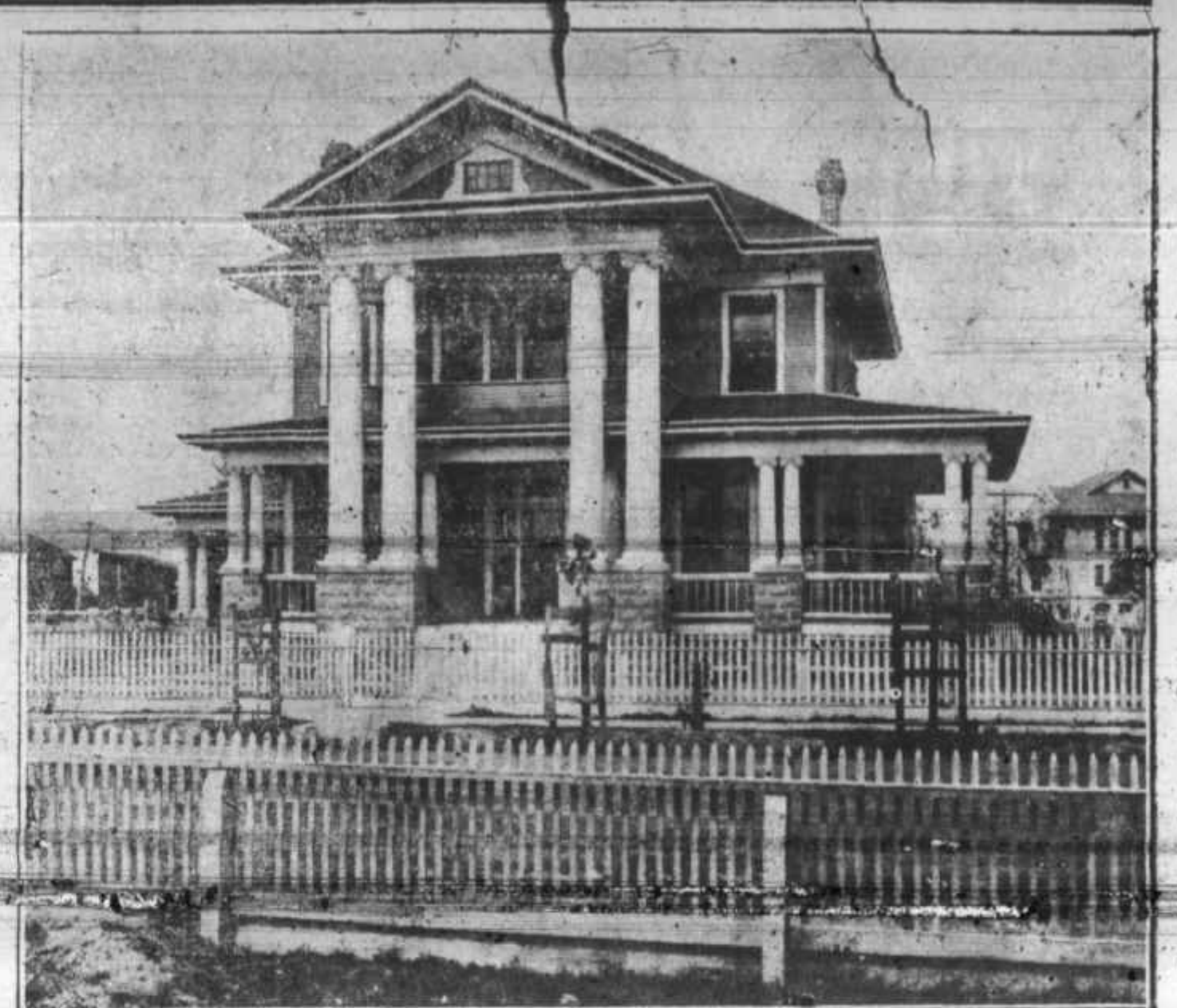
