IS PROBLEM FOR SCIENTISTS

Will Have Hard Work to Prove a Division Between Animate and Inanimate Nature.

We refuse to be jerked from the easy and virtuous tenor of our lives by the news that Professor Schaefer can produce life artificially. Was it not Sydney Smith who explained Coleridge's great work on metaphysics on the theory that it was "only his fun?" Possibly the learned Schaefer is amusing himself, and certainly he is amusing us, for we have heard this story before. Before any substance can be said to have been artificially endowed with life it must be proved—not merely asserted—that it did not already possess life, and as no one knows what life is the proof would be hard. But the professor "gave the show away" when he admitted that "the line between living and lifeless objects is growing less and less sharp as science penetrates into the heart of things." It may eventually be demonstrated that there is no such line, and the mind of the scientist, and that there is, in fact, no division between animate and inanimate nature. Science might save itself much speculative trouble by postulating a theory that life and matter are inseparable, that matter in its every form contains some elusive property which causes the cohesion of its parts and which is indistinguishable from the life of an organism.—San Francisco Argonaut.

SCENT AS AN INSOMNIA CURE
