IMPROVE FARM METHODS

A Letter to Farm Demonstration Workers and Others Who Will Join By O. G. Kolberg.

Orders from Washington necessitate my presence at A. & M. college from the 6th until possibly the 19th inst., consequently will not be able to meet many of our members this month.

Therefore by courtesy of the editor I take liberty of making public this letter to you who have enrolled as farm demonstrators or cooperators, and to others who are in sympathy with

and wish to share the benefits of farm demonstration work.

Now that we have begun a new year, let us start it right.

Plan your farm operations for the year now. Builders of successful enterprises are men of foresight who plan their operations months ahead.

Make a plat drawing of your farm. Let this plat show the location and area of each of your cultivated fields, your pastures and woodland.

field, it can be any area from one acre up to 20 or more. This field can be subdivided and planted to crops required by Texas Industrial Congress if desired. But the work on this field must be done thoroughly in every particular and as nearly according to demonstration methods as your circumstances permit.

Don't neglect the balance of your farm. Plan a system of crop rotation.

crop rotation. Never plant same crop on a field two successive seasons, unless cowpeas or other legumes have been grown and plowed into the soil in the time intervening between two regular crops. This is possible with potato, truck, corn and a few other crops.

Set aside one portion of your farm to be planted to cowpeas, velvet beans, soy beans, or some other legume to be used mainly as a soil builder by turning under vines and all while still green.

after gathering what you will need for seed for next year. The two elements most necessary for the upbuilding of southern soil is humus and nitrogen, and for this purpose there is nothing that compares with leguminous crops.

Good stable manure is worth about \$2.70 per ton, but the stable lot variety consists of little more than the bare humus worth probably not more than half the value of manure proper.

But with the present general run of scrub stock in this county and with little or no attention to the saving of manures, it is better to plow crop under while still green.

Commercial fertilizers have their value, but must be used with care. Phosphates and lime are of little value as fertilizers unless there is sufficient humus in the soil for them to act on.

Deep plowing is the first commandment of farm demonstration. But there are qualifying rules: Deep plowing should be done in the fall, or at least two months before planting, and should be disked and harrowed to aeriate the new soil.

Sandy soils should not be plowed early or deep unless to turn under legumes or humus. Sand with clay subsoil within reach of plow is benefited by turning up an inch of clay subsoil each year and mixing with sand.

Never plow down to wet sand or wet clay. Never plow any wet soils. Drain them first. Tile drainage is going to redeem thousands of acres in this county in the near future.

If plowing is delayed through some positive or unavoidable cause until close to planting time, do not run the plow deeper than one inch below former plowing.

Don't plant poor or uncertain seed. Get the best to be had if it costs several times what you have been accustomed to paying. It will repay you many fold.

Don't get seed corn grown north of Oklahoma; it will do better if grown in your own latitude. Test your seed and be sure of a good stand. Most of the trouble from worms is due to poor seed rotting in the ground.

Good seed sprout under ordinary conditions before any injury can come to it. Don't plant too early nor too late. Well drained soils can be planted several days or weeks often before poorly drained soils as latter remain cold
