New Way to Make Apple Dumplings

Served With Hard Sauce or Cream and Sugar. By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine. Here is a new way to make apple dumplings that will surely please every housewife. For it is not necessary to have whole apples, and the juice cannot run out and burn as with apple dumplings where the apple is placed in the center and the dough turned around it. The biscuit part forms a crispy shell that holds the apples and juice.



KC Apple Dumplings

One and one-half cups sifted flour; 1/2 teaspoonful salt; 1 level teaspoonful KC Baking Powder; 1/2 cup shortening; about 1/2 cup milk; 1 apple. Fill the cups of a buttered muffin pan with pared and sliced apples, sprinkle with salt and turn two or three table-spoonfuls of water into each cup. Sift together, three times, the flour, salt and baking powder; work in the shortening, and mix to a soft dough with the milk. Roll out on a floured surface to a thickness of about 1/8 inch. Cut out twenty-five minutes. Invert the pan on a large serving-dish. Put spoonful of hard sauce above the apple in each dumpling and finish with a grating of nutmeg.

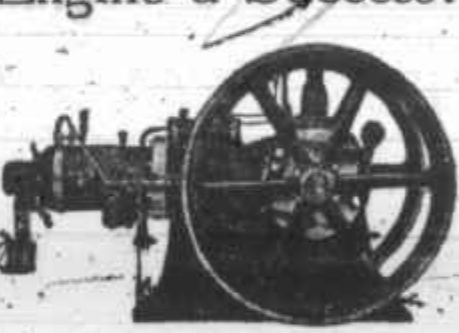

Eagle Lake, Texas, Jan. 11, 1913. Mr. T. L. Smith, City.

Dear Sir: Referring to the test run made with your ten horse Muncie Oil Engine wish to state that this engine did its work beyond my expectations.

It was started at 11:30 a. m. Friday, Jan. 3rd, using Electro crude oil as fuel and operated continuously night and day until 8 a. m. Wednesday, Jan. 8, with the exception of about 30 minutes caused by our inexperience in its operation. If we had to make this test run again we are quite sure it could be done without our shut-down.

After stopping, the ignition ball was removed and found to be absolutely clean and free from carbon.

For the first few days the engine was tried there was a leak in the head which allowed water to enter the combustion chamber, causing igniter spoon to run cool.

It runs as smoothly as any engine we have ever seen and is much more simple than any other engine we have ever seen, involving only two mechanically operated parts—the governor and the fuel pump.
