Rev. Stewart of West Point preached at the Methodist church Sunday night. He will preach here every fourth Sunday night.

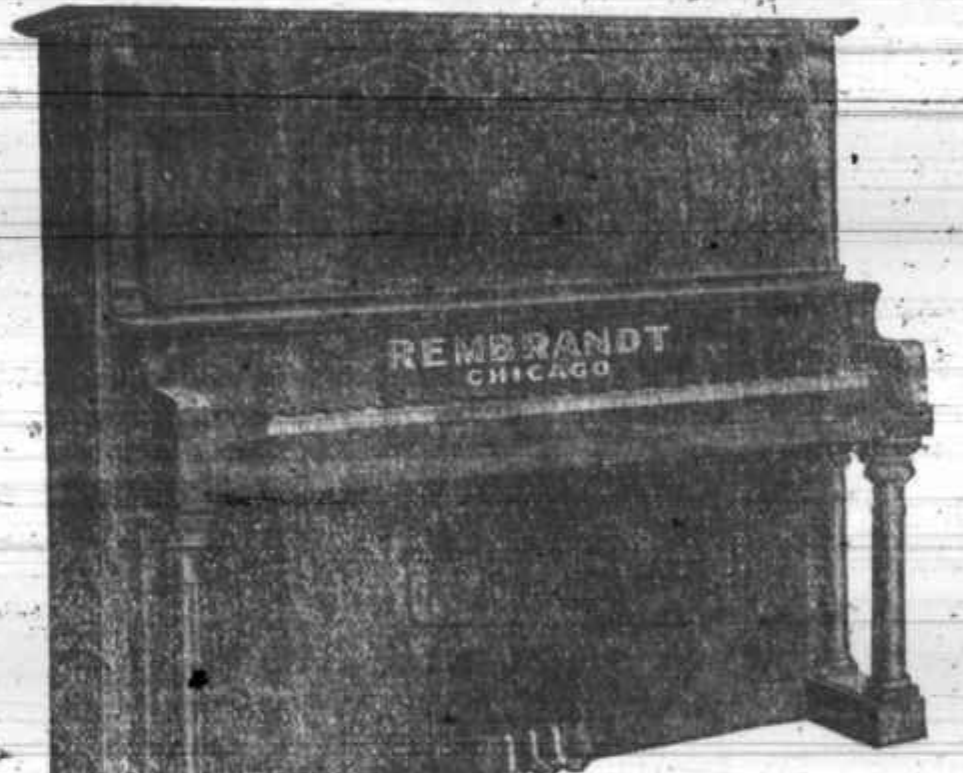
