HEADLIGHT OFFICE MOVED

Eagle Lake Paper Occupies Best
Country Office in South Texas.

The Headlight today is issued for the first time from the paper's new office on Main Street, the McCarty brick building formerly occupied by Burttschell & Kotzebue. The building has been fitted up especially for the paper's use, and, what is with a feeling of pride, yet without boast, the Headlight now occupies the most up-to-date and best equipped printing office of any small town printing office in this part of the state. We have now en route and are expecting its arrival every day, a large and high speed job press, which will be used in connection with the machinery we already have, thus enabling us to turn out and deliver with dispatch any and all kinds of job printing. There will be but practically few jobs of printing that can not now be done in Eagle Lake. We have gone to a big expense in fitting up our office in the manner we have, far more than our present patronage justifies, but Eagle Lake deserves it, for the citizens generally and the business men in particular, have shown their appreciation of the Headlight's efforts to please, and that their printing office and newspaper should be in keeping with the growth and prosperity of old Eagle Lake, with our desire to be able to get out a better paper, are responsible for the improvements that we have made. We propose to give Eagle Lake the very best possible paper that our patronage will justify, and in order to grow and expand in the manner we want to, it was necessary that we move into larger quarters. While it is with a feeling of more or less regret that we left our old quarters, where we have printed the Headlight for ten long years, and the pleasant neighbors and friends on that floor, still we needed more room to install heavier and larger machinery in order to turn out better printing and a better paper, and we were forced to move. While at the present time our office expenses are a great deal heavier than they were before, all we ask is that the people of Eagle Lake throw all the printing business our way that it is possible for them to do, and we shall always try to give our readers a newspaper worth while. While we are considerably handicapped in getting out this, the first issue from the new office, after this week we will have caught up with our work and will be ready to handle any kind of job printing. We

sincerely thank our patrons and friends who have so loyally stood by us for the past ten years and we assure them that every dollar's worth of business ever extended to us is highly appreciated. While we do think there are some firms in Eagle Lake that should patronize their paper's advertising columns that don't do it, we hold no ill will toward them for not doing so. We hope yet to be able to convert the non-advertiser, over to the progressive class, and if getting out a bright, nevy paper will do it, we hope yet to have them among our leading advertisers. It is a well known fact that we make nothing out of subscriptions. We would just about break even on the subscription department if every one paid up, but considering the fact that so many of them fail to pay their subscription accounts at the end of every year

shows a considerable loss to the owner. Thus, you will see that when an occasional disgruntled subscriber "stops his paper," the paper is by no means "put out of business." The subscription department of a country paper does not amount to a drop in the bucket, and were it not for the advertisements, this paper could not exist three weeks. 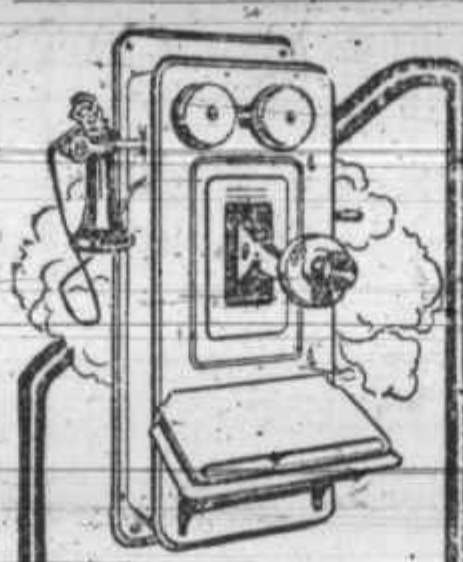

The State of Texas, County of Colorado.

On this the 10th day of February, A. D. 1913, this court being in regular session, came up to be considered the petition of W. S. Strickland and eighty-three (83) other persons praying that bonds be issued by that defined district of Colorado County, Texas, hereinafter described, for the purpose of operating and being known under the provisions of the road district act passed by the First Called Session of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Texas, and for the employment of said act, has been by order of said court established, described and defined as road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum and maturing forty years from the date thereof, with option of redeeming any part of same after ten (10) years, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled and paved roads and turnpikes, and in aid thereof in said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, which road district No. One of said Colorado County, Texas, is more particularly described by metes and bonds as follows:

Beginning on the east bank of the Colorado river at the north west corner of the G. Straussner Survey, being the south west corner of Justice Precinct No. 7, thence down the Colorado river with its meanderings to the Wharton county line; thence north easterly with the line between Wharton and Colorado counties to the San Bernado river—being the Austin county line; thence up the San Bernado river with its meanderings to the south east corner of H. & T. C. R. Co. Survey No. 2; thence west with the south line of said H. & T. C. R. Co. Survey No. 2 to the south west corner of same; thence south west with the line between A. D. Vaden and John Carlson Surveys to the east line of H. T. & B. R. R. Co. Survey No. 7, thence north west with the east line of said Survey to its extreme north corner; thence south west with the line between H. T. & B. R. R. Co. Survey No. 7, and the Renkin Survey—to the extreme south corner of said Renkin Survey in the north line of said H. T. & B. R. R. Co. Survey No. 7, being also the extreme east corner of Survey No. 8; thence north west with the west line of the Renkin Survey, which is also the east line of Survey No. 8, to the south line of the George Brune Survey; thence south west with said line to the extreme south corner of the said George Brune Survey in the east line of the Emily Simp-

son Survey No. 662; thence north west with the line between the George Brune and C. T. Survey No. 662 to the extreme north corner of said Survey No. 662, said point being in the north line of Commissions' Precinct No. 4; thence following the said Precinct No. 4, thence following the said Precinct line to the Colorado river as follows. South west with the North line of said C. T. Survey No. 662 to the east line of the Peter K. Bartleson Survey; thence north west with said line to the extreme North corner of the said Bartleson Survey; thence south west with the dividing line between the Little and A. Alley Surveys on the north, and the P. K. Bartleson Survey on the South to the north right-of-way line of the G. H. & S. A. Ry; thence north westerly with said right-of-way line to a point in same—opposite the north west line of the G. Straussner Survey; thence south west following the north west line of said G. Straussner Survey to the place of beginning. Subsequent to the above mentioned boundaries all of the above mentioned Justice's Precinct Number Eight (8), Colorado County, Texas, except H. & T. C. R. Co. Survey No. 2, Renz Survey No. 34; the John Carlson Survey, Moses Lapham Survey, George Brune Survey and the G. A. Litzman Survey.

And it appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpayers of said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, and that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas.

It is therefore considered and ordered by the court that an election be held in road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, on Wednesday the 26th day of March, A. D. 1913, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum and maturing forty years from the date thereof, with option of redeeming any part of same, after ten (10) years, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled and paved roads and turnpikes and in aid thereof in said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, for four successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto, there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election.

Said election shall be held at the usual voting place for holding general elections in said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, to-wit:

At Eagle Lake, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers and managers of said election at the said voting place, W. Y. Westmoreland, Judge; Haynie Matthews, Assistant Judge, and R. E. Walker and C. E. Woodward, Clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Road District act passed at the First Called Session of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Bonds and Levying of the Tax in Payment thereof," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

Against the Issuance of Bonds and the Levying of the Tax in Payment thereof."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State that govern general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said county, shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the County Judge is directed to cause said notice to be published in said road district No. One of Colorado County, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election.
