HOUSTON TEXAS

RICE MEN ARE INDICTED

Prominent Rice Men Face Federal
Court Charges.

Charged with violating the El-
kins act, Leo V. Hahn and An-
drew M. Waugh appeared in the
United States Court Thursday
afternoon and gave bond for their
appearance in the sum of \$2000
each. T. F. Ryan, jointly indi-
cated with the first two defendants
named, will make a similar bond
this morning.

The three defendants are a co-
partnership, doing business as
the Imperial Rice Company, with
principal offices in Houston, and
the indictment against them was
found by the Federal grand jury
sitting during the present term
of the United States District
Court in this city. The indi-
cment charges specifically that the
defendants named are guilty of
"obtaining concessions on Texas
rice, to wit: shipments of rice in
violation of the Elkins act."

There are eight specific counts
in the indictment. In brief all
of the counts are to the effect
that the defendants accepted con-
cessions from transportation
companies on interstate ship-
ments of rice by "wilfully and
knowingly falsify" representing
to a transportation company the
status of certain shipments of
rice made by them, the shipments
being destined to points outside
of Texas, and originating at Tex-
as points other than Houston, al-
though the shipments were made
from this city to interstate
points.

Apocrops of the above it appears
that the railroad tariffs under
which the rice moved in Texas
say: "A carload of clean rice
may be partly loaded at one point
and stopped at a directly inter-
mediate point to finish loading at
a charge of \$5 for the stop."

The first count in the indi-
cment alleges that the defendants
received a car of rice containing
599 sacks from Bay City to Hou-
ston, the rate from Bay City to
Houston on such rice being 19
cents the 100 pounds, the ship-
ment being received over the
Galveston, Harrisburg & San
Antonio Railroad and that a few
days later, on January 11, 1911,
a shipment containing 600 sacks
of rice was delivered the Texas
& New Orleans Railroad by the
defendants to be delivered
through the several connections
to consignees at Keokuk, Ia. The
indictment sets forth that the
through rate on such rice ship-
ment from either Bay City or
Houston to Keokuk was 35 cents
the 100 pounds. That, further-
more, 599 sacks of rice tendered
the Texas and New Orleans Rail-
road in the interstate shipment
of 600 sacks was represented by
the defendants to the transpor-
tation company as being the ship-
ment received by them from Bay
City under the tariff clause per-
mitting a car to be stopped at a
directly intermediate point to fin-
ish loading, when, as a matter of
fact—it is so alleged—the rice
from Bay City was, not in the
shipment of 600 sacks which
moved from Houston to Keokuk.
And that the defendants know-
ingly solicited and accepted from
the transportation company the
10 cents the 100 pounds allowed
them on such an alleged ship-
ment from Bay City to Houston
—this being the Bay City-Hous-
ton rate, which, when deducted
from the through rate of 35 cents
from either Bay City or Houston
to Keokuk, would result in the
defendants securing through
such alleged misrepresentation a
through rate approximating 19

or 17 cents the 100 pounds.

The above is the basis of the
whole charge, and is the theme
of each count in the indictment.

The second count, the third
count and the fourth count are
identical with the first count,
the dates of shipment and the
number of sacks in contention
alone differing from the first
count.

The fifth count has to do with
a shipment made under identical
circumstances from El Campo to
Houston, while the sixth count
named Eagle Lake as the point of
shipment of the rice under con-
tention in that special count.

The same rate applies in both
the latter counts as in the first
counts named. The seventh
count has to do with a shipment
made from Houston to Denver,
the through rate being 65 cents.
A shipment of Bay City rice
enters into the contention in this
count, the Bay City through rate
to Denver being the same as the
Houston through rate.

The eighth count names Pen-
sacola as the interstate point,
the through rate from Houston
to Pensacola being 34 cents the
100 pounds. A shipment of Bay
City rice to the defendants in this
count, the Bay City through rate
to Houston being the same as the
Houston through rate.

The shipments of rice entering
into the indictment were all
made during the first three
months of 1911, as set forth in
the charges. It is said that a
special agent of the Government
has long had the matter in hand
collecting evidence, and at the
last session of the Federal grand
jury the evidence presented them
resulted in the indictment.
