Concerning the Road Bonds.

So much has, recently been said by those opposing the proposed bond issue for good roads with reference to the alleged illegality of same on account of the slight change in the territory that those in charge of the measure had Mr. A. J. Wirtz take the entire record to date to Austin this week and lay it before the Attorney General and this official's letter to Mr. Wirtz showing that everything long to date has been both regular and legal is as follows:

"Dear Sir: I have today examined the record of your proceedings in the matter of Colorado County Road District No. 1 Road Bonds, and beg to report that I find no objections to the proceedings so far. The district seems to have been properly established and the proceedings seem to be otherwise regular in every respect. The partial record, however, contains only the proceedings leading up to the notice of election. If, when a full record of the proceedings is presented to this department for approval, proper notice is shown, the election carried and proper order of the court entered authorizing the bonds, I see no reason why the record should not be approved.

Statements have also been circulated that the money derived from the sale of the bonds could only be applied to the construction and maintenance of macadamized, graveled and paved roads and turnpikes, probably based on the statement of the purpose in the notice of election. This notice follows the caption of the statutes, but the law has been so construed as to allow the money derived from the sale of such bonds to be applied to the establishment and improvement of roads of any description, the same as the county can do with the general road fund; and those in charge of the measure have the opinion of persons in position to know to this effect.

It may be said further that there is no law now on the statute books authorizing a special road tax for a district of the county, but only for the county as a whole, and the proceeds of which special road tax must be expended on the county as a whole under the direction of the commissioners. It is proposed to follow the serial issue of bonds, the Ray City plan, by which the bonds are sold as needed, and the sinking fund collected under other methods applied to the payment of the principal each year,

A Tribute.

Ella Harris, daughter of Ira A. and Dilue Rose Harris, was born at Columbus, Texas, September 25th, 1847. Her early girlhood knew the struggle and privation incident to the Civil War and the training of these years bore its part in the formation of a character of natural strength and decision.

She was twice married: first to Captain A. C. McNeely of North Carolina, who died in 1873, leaving besides his widow, an infant daughter, Nora, whose death a few years later was one of the great sorrows of her life. On July 10th, 1876, she was married to John A. Guynn, for many years one of Eagle Lake's most honored citizens. At his death in 1894, she was left with three sons, Milby, E., John A. J., and Cleveland, all of whom survive her and by lives of usefulness and integrity bear witness to her worth and devotion. Other relatives are an aged mother, Mrs. Harris, two sisters, one of whom, Mrs. Geo. S. Ziegler, resides in Eagle Lake, the other, Mrs. Christian Hahn of El Campo, and four brothers, Joe and Guy Harris of Houston, Ira Harris of Altair and Lee Harris of Parrell, Okla.

"This little we can say: 'She was born, she has lived, she is dead,' to the casual reader these brief words tell all the story of a human life but there are ever those to whom they bear a deeper meaning and to all who knew Mrs. Guynn they bring their full measure of sorrow and heartache. No one who knew her has not cause to love her memory for some act of kindness or word of sympathy and love. A practical Christian and an exponent of the Religion of Love, her daily life bore testimony to a character of unusual strength and sweetness. For many years a resident of

Eagle Lake, her willing hands have soothed the pain of dying age and dried the tear of sorrowing childhood in almost every home within its bounds. Ever freely she gave of her strength, her means, her sympathy; and the world has been a better and a happier place because she lived in it.

She is dead! The fragrant blossoms with which loving hands covered the soil above her, have withered and are gone, but in the hearts of her friends there bloom for her fadeless flowers; the immortelles of memory with forget-me-nots of love.

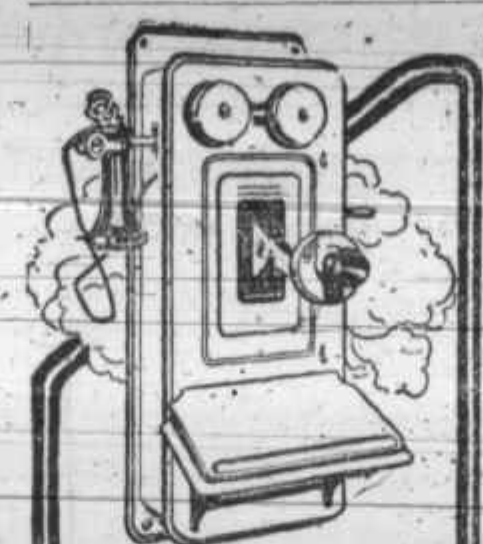

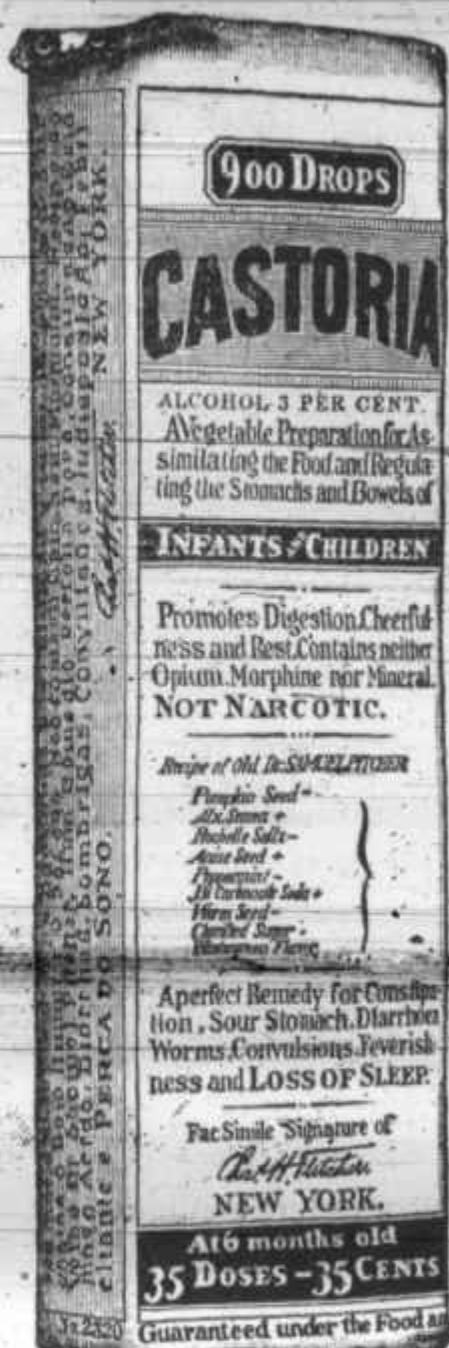
