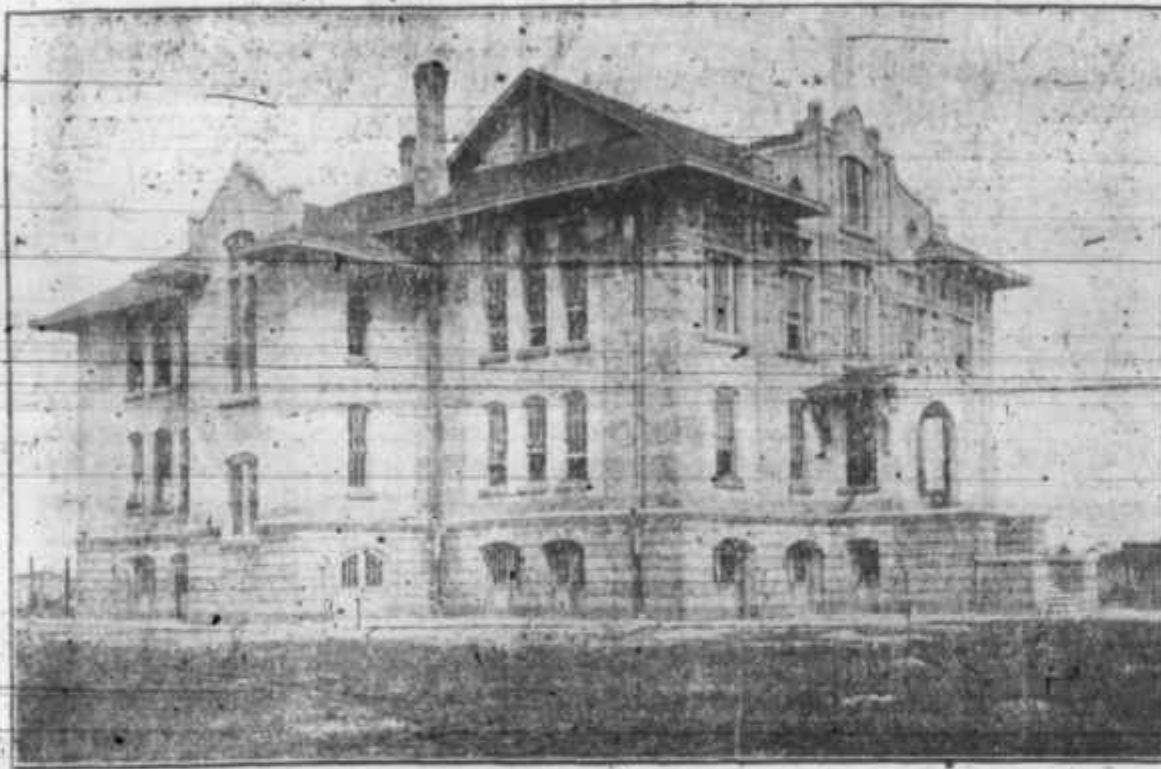
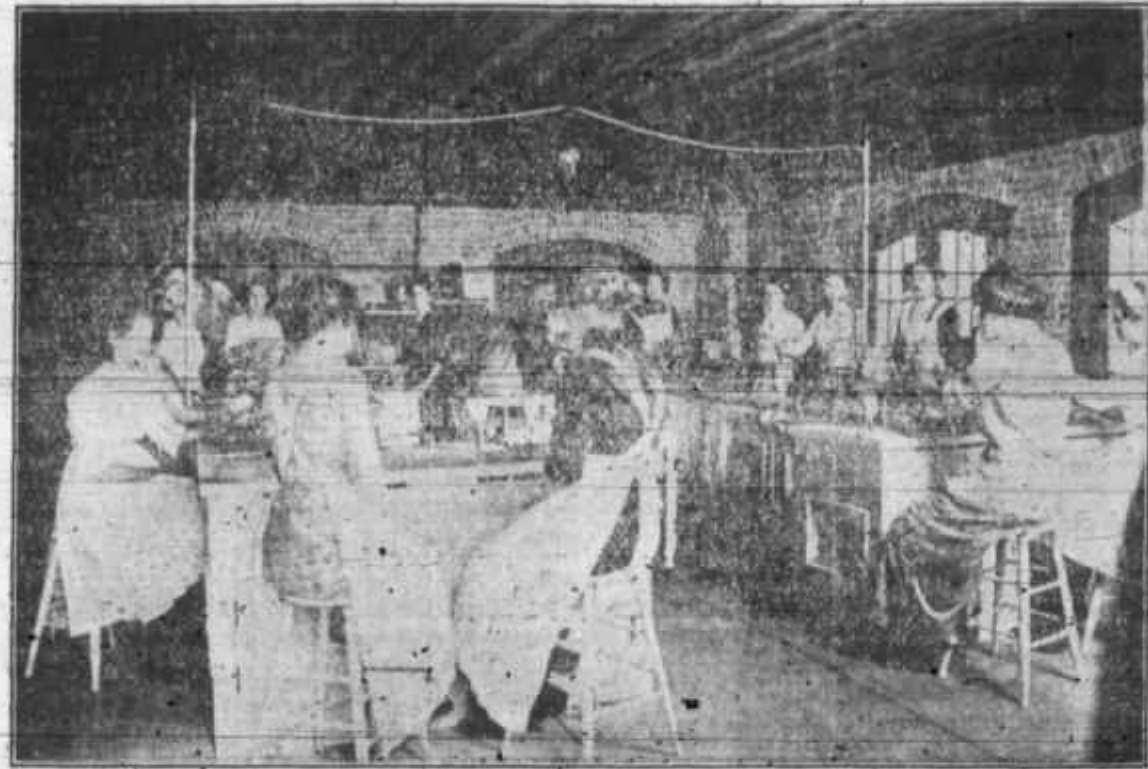


CONVENTION OF SOUTH TEXAS TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION NOW IN SESSION

SOUTH TEXAS TEACHERS ARE HERE

Annual Meeting of The South Texas Teachers' Association Is In Session Here.—About One Hundred and Thirty Visitors Here—Many More Expected on Evening Trains.

The annual session of the South Texas Teachers' Association was called to order at 8:30 o'clock this morning in the auditorium of the school building by the president, Supt. C. A. Peterson of Yoakum, with Miss Emma Searcy, secretary, of Hallettsville, at her official desk.

The meeting called to order by the president, the following program was carried out up to the noon hour today.

Invocation by Rev. J. E. Loy, the local Methodist pastor.

Address of Welcome by Mayor P. P. Putney.

Response to the mayor's address by Superintendent T. G. Harris.

Paper, "The Place of Home Economics in the School Curriculum," by Miss Mary Gearing of the University of Texas.

"Method of Teaching Home Economics," a lecture and demonstration, by Miss Jessie Rich of the University of Texas.

Lecture, "The Teacher and the Community," by Dr. Austin of the University of Texas.

The association then adjourned until 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, at which hour the following program will be taken up:

"The Feeding of the School Children," Miss Jessie Rich.

"Some Problems of Clothing and Shelter," by Miss Mary Gearing.

"The Teacher and the Business of Farming," by Dr. Austin.

"Solution of Rural School Problems," by Superintendent L. L. Pugh of Houston.

After the adjournment this afternoon at half past four o'clock, fifty automobiles will be in waiting at the school grounds to take all the visiting teachers for a

ride over the city and seven miles into the country through the potato growing section, thus showing them the biggest little town and the best farming section in Texas.

Tonight's program at the auditorium will begin promptly at 8:00 o'clock, as follows:

"Health and Housing," illustrated, by Dr. Austin.

"Vital Problems," by Mrs. J. B. Dibrell of Seguin.

Address by State Superintendent P. M. Bralley of Austin.

Immediately after adjournment of the session tonight, a reception and social will be tendered the visitors in the basement of the school building by the ladies of the W. C. T. U. Refreshments will be served.

Annual business meeting, election of officers and selection of next meeting place.

There are in Eagle Lake this morning about one hundred and twenty-five or thirty visiting teachers and many more are expected on the morning and afternoon trains, and it is believed that by the time for the night session the number will have reached two hundred.

The entire teaching forces of Bay City, Hallettsville, Yoakum, Cuero, Flatonia, Rosenberg and Richmond are here. Bay City

will put forth a strong effort to secure the next meeting of the association, and from all indications it looks like the association will go to Bay City next year.

Among the many arrivals on the early Santa Fe this morning were Dr. Austin, Miss Mary Gearing, Miss Jessie Rich, of the University of Texas, and State Superintendent P. M. Bralley from Austin, all of whom will take part on the program.

Prof. T. G. Harris, former principal of the Southwest Texas Normal at San Marcos, is among the visitors.

Another visitor of note is Mrs. J. B. Dibrell of Seguin, who is one of the most prominent club women in Texas. She will also take part on the program.

Among the visiting teachers who arrived here on the early train this morning were fourteen beautiful young ladies from Cuero, Oh, you Cuero!

Miss Sallie Jones, who is teaching in the Yoakum schools, a former popular and efficient teacher in the Eagle Lake school, is among the visitors here for the association. Miss Sallie is a favorite with the people of Eagle Lake, and her many friends are delighted to see her.

There was but a very small attendance of Eagle Lake people at the session this morning. These sessions are open to all. They are very entertaining and instructive, and the faculty and school board urge that the home people attend all the remaining sessions of the association.

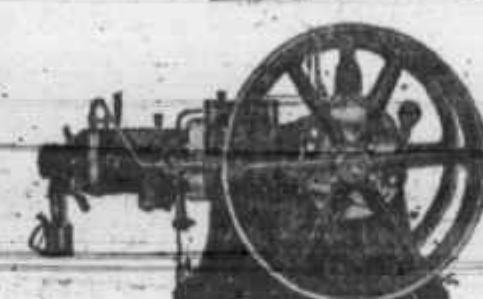

The Muncie

Crude oil engine makes good in Arkansas nice fields.



The following is copied from the "New Era" of DeWitt, Ark. It sounds like an advertisement, but in reality was inserted by Mr. McKuskey, who is so enthusiastic that he wants all of his neighbors to know of this wonderful engine.

"The above power operator is one of the most successful pumping plants in the country, located on the Walton farm, 24 miles south of DeWitt. Although only 40 h. p., this machine puts out a full pipe of water 24 hours in the day and every day in the week, caring for 220 acres of rice. The season just closed in a first class manner. It operates on practically half the volume of fuel required by other internal combustion machines and uses a low grade of oil, which costs less than half the price of naphtha. The longest run made during the season just closed was 516 hours without missing an explosion, throwing a continuous stream which varied between 1100 and 1200 gallons per minute, and consuming between 34 and 4 gallons of low grade oil (32 degrees gravity) at 4 cents per gallon.

The machine is very simple in construction and although it has pumped as much water as 50 and 60 horse power machines on neighboring plants, it has gone through the season without any of its working parts being taken apart or one cent expense for repairs."
