Bonds! Bonds! Bonds!

Much talk and discussion is being heard now-a-days regarding good roads. While some people favor a gigantic bond issue of one hundred thousand dollars on the property of a thinly settled, small subdivision of territory, comprising less than one justice precinct in Colorado county, Texas, there are others who think the estimates are hog-wild, unreasonable, unnecessary and out of all proportion and would create such a stupendous fund of available cash as to create an incentive to graft and extravagance.

This heavy bond issue will incur a heavy burden on the taxpayers to keep the interest paid, but dough-nuts to dollars, in comparing the interest to the principal, when these bonds mature, will the rising generation forty years hence, when they are asked to pay the interest, praise our judgment, wisdom and justice in saddling this unpardonable sin on innocent debt-ridden bonded people, which many will be unable to meet, and will have to sell their land to pay the debt.

It is an easy matter to talk and bring so-called-road experts here to tell the farmers that during one wet spell it would cost the rice and cotton growers thousands of dollars by the failure to get their produce to market and catch the high prices. It appears some people don't know what calamity they do suffer without being told.

Keep it up, you High Bonders, bring in more experts to tell and teach us rummies and hay-seeds what we need in the shape of roads and don't forget your civil engineers, to go over the roads and stake out the grades, and we are told the engineers must call

on the farmers, living near the creeks and streams, to get the high water mark so the engineer will know how high to stake the grade.

Our plan is to let the farmers stake the grades and send the engineer back to some job that he understands better. What I think we need is to get the roads up out of the water with sufficient crest to allow teams to pass without sliding in the bar ditches. In making this grade sufficient clay can be taken out of the bar ditches and mixed with the sand, which would make a good combination for a road dressing, and do the work at the proper time, and we don't need an expert to tell us what that time is no more than the rice and cotton farmers need an expert to tell them when to plant and prepare their land, and this expense can be borne without binding our children's children in bonds.
