Mr. E. Middleton returned Sunday night from a business visit to Minneapolis, Minn., and Chicago. He says he experienced some very cold weather while he was away.

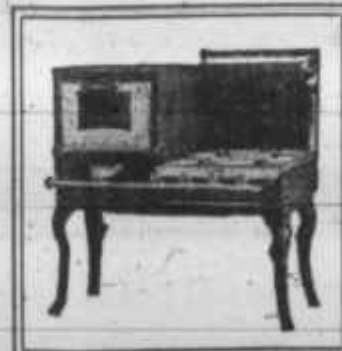

BOND ISSUE WAS DEFEATED

Result in Wednesday's Election Again Defeated Bond Issue.

There were 225 votes polled in the election here Wednesday to determine whether or not bonds in the sum of \$100,000 shall be issued for the building of good roads in this, road precinct number one. For the issue there were cast 190; against the issue, 132. Three votes were thrown out, having been cast for the issue, but not being counted.

The issue, by the above vote, is again defeated, as the law requires that a bond issue of this kind must carry by a two-thirds majority and the issue lacks just 24 votes of having a two-thirds majority. Had the opposition's vote remained at 182, then 24 votes more for the issue would have been required to carry. Had the opposition gained in the same proportion, then 76 votes would have been necessary for the issue to have carried.

The result of the election is somewhat a surprise, as most every one conceded that the election would carry. Last September the same kind of an election was held here, the issue being defeated at that time by 19 votes.

Bennie Klaus, driving a car for the Smith Auto Company, collided with a buggy driven by Mr. J. W. Thatcher about four miles out of town on the Wharton road last Monday, knocking two spokes out of one of the rear wheels of the buggy. The accident occurred in passing on the road, the fender of the car striking the buggy wheel.
