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To the Voters of Road District Number One.

Eagle Lake, March 27th, 1913.
Yesterday you again decided against a bond issue for the improvement of our public roads. The bad condition of our roads is generally admitted and some means must be found to improve them before they will be in such shape that any one can get from place to place in any weather.

Now, I want to put a few questions to M. D. Flowers, Haynie Matthews, H. P. Hahn, N. W. Callison, Dr. J. K. Davidson, C. H. McCormick, S. Garmon and others, some of whom are public officials. I want to ask these and others who opposed the bond issue the following: Are you in favor of good roads? Are our roads good or bad? If they are bad are you in favor of improving them and are you willing to pay your just share for improving them? If you are opposed to the bond issue have you any definite plan by which our roads can all be well drained and graded in the near future? Have you any plan by which the money can legally be raised to pay for this work?

This road question is a public question and as long as you have opposed the bond issue it is fair that you should give a public reason for it. A large majority of the tax payers have twice declared in favor of the bonds and would probably be glad to hear your reason for opposition.

I and the others who have favored the bond issue have publicly given our reasons for it at every opportunity and have plainly and fairly informed the voters just what we proposed to do and what it would cost them. Now we ask you to do the same.

To those in favor of good roads

I say that we may not encourage for the support the bonds received, which was just 24 short of two-thirds majority. If we keep on working we shall soon induce enough of our neighbors to join us to make the necessary majority. This morning after the election, I have not a single sore spot and, have not stopped.

I am stronger for the roads than ever because of the heavy support given them. Let us keep up the fight, counsel together and secure this much needed improvement. If any better plans is produced which is practical I shall gladly help and believe all friends of good roads will do the same. Reform the lines and elect any captain you like and I will follow him through, or call me for any other duty and I will gladly serve.

Humpty Dumpty

An empty egg shell, bits of wire, and strips of colored tissue paper are all the materials necessary for making a Humpty Dumpty doll that will stand alone or fall off a wall.

Having blown out the egg, draw the face and cap on the shell. Twist together two or three light weight hairpins for each leg and spread them at the ends, so they will stand.
