Wages and Living Cost.

The outcome of the hearing of the board chosen under the Erdman act to arbitrate demands of the firemen employed on fifty-four Eastern railways for higher wages and better working conditions is of large interest not only to the parties immediately concerned in the agreement that may be reached, but to the general public as well. For the truth can not be concealed that in any added cost for the operation of the railway system of the country, whether resulting from increase in the wages of employees, betterment of conditions for the latter, or improvement in service and equipment in the interest of the public, the people themselves must in the final analysis bear most if not all of the extra burden.

The firemen are contending that under prevailing conditions of living they are paid less than is adequate, and that under the requirements of modern railway service the conditions under which they have to perform such

service are neither as safe nor as comfortable as they should be.

On the other hand, the railroad claim that they have advanced wages to as high a point as they can consistent with the interests of stockholders and in compliance with the demands of the law for efficiency of service to the public.

In support of the firemen's side of the argument the testimony of James E. Bell, a fireman for the Pennsylvania lines, before the board on Tuesday is of interest as setting forth facts that are pretty generally applicable to conditions which affect the organized wage-earning classes. In his testimony he admitted that during the more than six years he had been with the company he had received several increases in pay, but he said: "I don't have any more money at the end of the month than I had when I first started."

Being questioned as to the reason, I have to pay more for rent and more for living expenses and everything is so high I don't seem to be any better off."

With such testimony as this on the one side, and the offsetting testimony that is sure to be introduced by the other side relative to the burdensome conditions which the railways have to meet in order to fulfill their public obligations, it may readily be conceived that the board of arbitration has a responsible and difficult task to perform in arriving at an equitable decision as to the concessions that should be made by the respective parties to the controversy.
