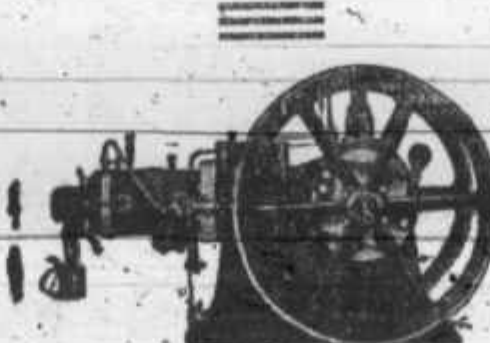

MANSFIELD FOR CONGRESS

Friends of Columbus Jurist Push Him to the Front.

Columbus, Tex., March 24.—For some time it has been known that the friends of County Judge J. J. Mansfield of Colorado county have been urging him to make the race for representative of his district in the United States congress. Judge Mansfield, it is said, has been in a receptive condition, but together with some of his closest friends, he has been awaiting the action of the Texas legislature in the matter of redistricting the state. Indeed it is probable that the Judge and some of his friends, still prefer to wait on the legislature, hoping that it will put through a re-districting measure, either in April, if the governor calls a special session right away, or next summer, when, at the latest, the legislature will be called to provide money for the support of the State government.

It is believed now that the counsel of a more direct and militant body of Judge Mansfield's friends will prevail and that he will soon authorize a positive statement of announcement, regardless of whether a new district will be formed or not. Indeed that class of the Judge's friends who wish him to announce right now, and who will without doubt influence his actions to the end, boldly declare that he can easily defeat Mr. Burgess, the present incumbent.

Judge Mansfield's friends urge that Colorado county owes him a promotion for his invaluable service to the county in relieving it from a staggering burden of indebtedness on a heavy bonded debt. They say that the Judge got a large bonded debt, bearing six percent interest refunded and three percent bonds substituted, and on many such occasions he has relieved the burdens of taxation and strengthened the credit of the county at the same time.

The Judge's friends are proud of his recent elevation to the highest positions of Masons in Texas—that of Grand Master—and point to that as a proof that Judge Mansfield is of congressional size as a man and statesman.

It would please his friends very much if Austin county could be included in the same district, as the social and political relations of the two counties are very intimate, and Judge Mansfield is well and favorably known and would receive enthusiastic support from many friends in Austin county. However, his friends desire, regardless of districts, to push the Judge into the race, and their counsels and importunities will no doubt prevail.—New Ulm Enterprise.
