Texas Cattle Raisers' Ass'n.

Galveston, Texas, April 4.

Texas cattle raisers are deeply
interested in the outcome of the
tariff bill. They are fearful that
the duty on live stock will be re-
moved, and they predict that if
this is done the Texas industry
will be ruined. President A. L.

McFaddin of Victoria, of the
Texas-Cattle Raisers' Association,
is in the city stopping at
Hotel Galvez. In discussing the
probability of free beef he said:

"I would dispose of my cattle
right away and let the beef trust
have them. The democrats
have been led into a trap and the
trust has baited it with free
meat. We have in this country
30,000,000 head of cattle and 20,000,

000 milk cows. Mexico has 5,
000,000 head and Canada 7,000,
000." But down in Argentine,

where they have 30,000,000 head,
and 25,000,000 in Brazil, the trust
has laid the foundation for its
work. It has its steamship lines,
refrigerator plants and every-
thing in readiness to rush its
meats into the market the mo-
ment the tariff is removed. Then
what would be the result? It
would be able to raise and pur-
chase cattle in South America
at a cheaper price than we could
think of producing them, and
at the same time protect its
monopoly, being careful not to
overburden the market. The
cattle raisers in Texas and the
United States would suffer, and
the consumer would have to
pay as dearly for his meat as he
does now, and probably a little
bit more."

Aside from the tariff question,
Mr. McFaddin says that the Tex-
as cattle, especially the herds in
the Southwest, are in fine condi-
tion because of the mild winter
and the abundance of grass and
forage. The rains have kept
the ranges green, he says, and
the cattle will go to market fat
and sleek. -Houston Chronicle.
