Increase of Drinking, Chewing and Smoking

In spite of appeals from pulpits and press, in spite of the admonitions of eminent medical men and learned scientists, the American people are becoming more strongly joined to their bad habits as the years roll on. Appeals have been thundered at us from every direction depicting the horrors of strong drink and the use of the filthy weed, but in response to the appeals we drink more, smoke more and chew more, according to the latest tax returns to Commissioner of Internal Revenue Gabell. From July until this February the nation has consumed ninety-four million gallons of whiskey, an increase of five million gallons over the same period of last year.

eight billion, five hundred million cigarettes, an increase of two billion, two hundred and fifty million; four billion, five hundred million cigars, an increase of two hundred and fifty million; and two hundred and fifty million pounds of smoking and chewing tobacco, an increase of twelve million pounds. In addition beer drinkers are resuming their stride. During the 1912 fiscal year beer consumed fell off materially, but for the first seven months of the current fiscal year the people of the United States have drunk 88,844,000 barrels, an increase of 1,850,000 barrels over last year. Drinkers, smokers and chewers are thus enriching the federal government. Internal revenue taxes from July 1 to date are \$12,500,000 greater

than for any previous similar period.—KX.

A Communication On The Bond Issue Question.

To the Headlight.

Having been prevented by sickness from discussing "Some Ethical Objections to the Bond Issue," as advertised, I beg to say, even now, to Mr. Engelhard and some others that it was a great disappointment to me. But as Emerson says, and I heartily recommend the saying to the advocates of the bond issue, "The compensations of calamity are made apparent after long intervals of time, and the sure years reveal the deep remedial force that underlies all fact."

I feel fully justified by the result of the election in believing that my use of printer's ink induced at least, a few to think, and to say that the biggest thing in our schemes of civil government is "the man behind the bolt," and just back, I beg to call attention to a few special periods in the history of the race.

The singer, who sang of the pyramids prime, Has gone the way of things. But the sun and moon, and the heart of man, Are just the same as then.

Yet, in spite of this, "the world does move," and the relation of the ruler and the ruled is slowly, but surely, emerging towards a higher and broader vital liberty for the masses and the individual. 'Tis a far, far cry from the day when the vic-

torious armies of Marius and the Caesars, with their chained captives and the spoils of war, marched over the world famed "Appian Way" into Rome, and then, to make a Roman holiday, threw those captives into the arena to meet death in the gladiatorial strife to that day when the brothers of those chained captives marched in over that same famed "Appian Way" to beat down the gates of proud, cruel, imperial Rome, to do their pleasures there, and leave her prostrate and divested of her power forever. It was a far, far cry from that day, when, in the city of Frankfurt, Germany, the Jews were held as corporation chattels and sold to whoever wished to buy. To that day when the Rothschilds became the virtual owners, as they are today of Frankfurt, and the money of the purse strings of Europe, and when Disraeli should be elevated to the place of Prime Minister of the British Empire. It was a far, far cry from that day when the Barons of old England wrestled from King John those concessions which constitute the Magna Charter of the Anglo Saxon of the day of our own Declaration of Independence; and as Magna Charter secured the rights of the people against the power of the king, so did our Declaration of Independence, and subsequently, the "Bill of Rights," as per the Constitution guarantee the rights of the individual against the power of the majority, though the individual be in a minority of one. It was a far, far cry from that day when the Duke of Hesse, a German Prince, hired his vassals to King George to fight the American Colonies. And who were the hired mercenaries specifically mentioned in our Declaration of Independence, to that day of, so recent date, when the Socialist members of the Reichstag should boldly denounce the governmental measures of so autocratic a ruler as Kaiser Wilhelm. And now, Mr. Engelhard, and "some others," the Book of Books suggestively silent as to Nationalities, State Lines, Ancestry, Environments, etc., says in the simplest terms, "That as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he;" and further, "Out of the heart are the issues of life." And so it comes, that in that land today "low grassy mounds still tell where, in the name of liberty," many a hero fell with sword in hand, and standing prepared to substantiate my claim to a birth right in this glorious heritage of precious men-

ories and traditions. I am of course perfectly familiar, and I use the word familiar advisedly, (and you are at perfect liberty to interpret as may suit you best) with negroes. And I am more than glad to say in their behalf, that the instances of their fidelity (and fidelity be it known is the noblest attribute of humanity) are at once numerous and familiar, and as the poet Gray says of the yeomanry of England, so do I in grateful acknowledgement of their services say of them:

"Yet to their side did the harvest yield, Their furrow on the southern glebe has broken: How proud did they drive their teams abroad, How low the woods beneath their sturdy spade!"
