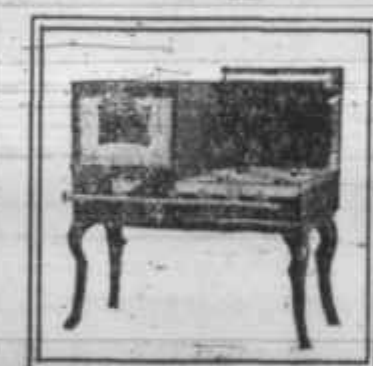

BAR HAVEN A BIG SUCCESS

Plays to Good Houses in Eagle Lake and Also in Wharton.

The local talent show, "Bar Haven," presented at Frazier's opera house last Friday night by the members of the Baraca-Philathea class of the Baptist church was a big success. Every member of the cast was good and the songs between the acts by the various members were especially pleasing. Carroll Stephen, as Captain Hopper, an old fisherman, was good. Raymond Fitzgerald, as a helper, with ambition to be a lawyer, was good. The part of Leo Bradley, a New York lawyer, was ably handled by R. E. Williamson. Gideon Graham, a wealthyascal, was one of the best acted characters of the cast. This role was taken by R. E. Walker, and he was clever. He has had, experience on the stage and we all expected him to be good. But so well did he play the part that he would make the average professional ashamed of himself. J. E. Roberts looked and acted the part of the Rev. John Wesley Watkins so naturally that it was hard for the audience to believe the actor was really Mr. Roberts. Miss Bertha Smith, as Mrs. Wardell, one of the leading and most difficult parts, was splendid. She is exceptionally clever on the stage and put life and expression in her lines. Paul Brown as Cy Brackett, one of the comedy characters, was fine. Paul has appeared on the local stage before and has always been good. In his character in Bar Haven, it was easily seen that he has wonderful talents as a comedian. Miss Nora Barrow as Florence Wardell, Miss Gene Welford as Spray Hopper and Miss Ruth Cooke as Arbella Wortendyke, were all good and knew their parts perfectly. One of the hardest roles in the play, that of Kate Wardell, was handled by Miss Mary Edna Boothe in a charming manner.

REVIVAL MEETING CLOSED

Meeting at Christian Church Resulted in Twenty-Two Additions

The three weeks' revival meeting at the Christian church closed on Monday night, with twenty-two new members having been added to the church roll during the meeting. The meeting has been a successful one and a most beneficial one, not only in point of new members, but the church as a whole has been greatly revived and the members have entered the work with a new zeal. More than \$400 have been subscribed by the members of the church for all his time. The church is now in communication with several good preachers and it is expected that one of them will be here in the course of the next few weeks to take charge of the work. Evangelist Arthur W. Jones is one of the finest and most fluent preachers ever heard in Eagle Lake. He left Monday night for a week's visit to his family in Waco. Prof. Douthitt, the song leader, left the following morning for a visit to his home in Austin. They will meet next week at Cooper, Texas, where they will begin another revival meeting.

The HEADLIGHT editor enjoyed his first meal of new Irish potatoes last Sunday, same having been presented him the day before by Mr. A. T. Westmoreland. These potatoes were grown on the farm of Westmoreland Bros. and were about the size of hens eggs. They were planted in January and were last week "laid by" for digging. The Messrs. Westmoreland have sixty-five acres of potatoes and the ones he exhibited here last Saturday were the largest and furthest advanced of any potatoes we have seen so far this spring. Mr. Westmoreland has a home-made plow, something of his own construction, which he has been using on his farm in the potato culture. This new plow is doing the work so thoroughly that it is gaining the attention of all the potato growers, and aside from the fact that the Westmoreland Bros. are proving themselves first-class potato farmers, the "Westmoreland Potato Plow" is coming in for a full share of comment.

At the meeting of the city council last Tuesday night Mr. R. E. Walker was elected city secretary to succeed Mr. O. R. Davis, who tendered his resignation to the city as such officer, owing to the fact that he soon expects to move to Waco.

NEW THOMAS RICE WELL

First Well in That Section Down to Second Stratum of Water.

The new rice well Mr. G. E. Thomas at his farm about four miles from Eagle Lake, was completed and given a test run last Monday, a number of people from town going out to see the new well. This well is ninety-five feet deep and is the first well in that immediate section going down to the second stratum of water. There are a number of wells, however, that go down to the third and many other shallow wells. Thomas is the first in that territory to tap the second or middle stratum. The new Thomas well was put down by members of Mr. Thomas' own family and is said to be one of the best wells in this section of the country. This is the same well in which the bones of some prehistoric animal were found while the well was being dug, mention of which was made in this paper at the time. Some of the professors came here from the A. & M. College and bought the bones from Mr. Thomas. They wanted him to take out the others which were visible in the well, but Mr. Thomas was afraid it would injure the walls of the well to do so, and therefore did not remove them. The new Thomas well will irrigate one hundred and fifty acres of rice and flows a stream of from twelve hundred to fifteen hundred gallons per minute.
