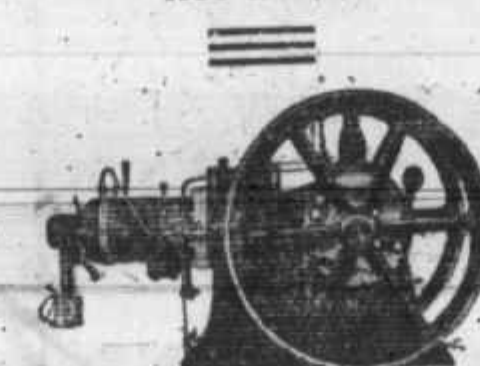

The Muncie

The following is copied from the "New Era" of DeWitt, Ark. It sounds like an advertisement, but in reality was inserted by Mr. McKuskey, who is so enthusiastic that he wants all of his neighbors to know of this wonderful engine.

The Penalty of Over Production in Colorado County.

The Federal Census Report proves the wisdom of the Farmers' Union in appealing to the farmers to reduce the cotton acreage this season and the statistics bring out with mathematical exactness the penalty of overproduction. The Federal reports show the United States produced 16,109,349 bales in 1911, which sold for \$782,420,000 and in 1910 there were 11,955,962 bales produced which sold for \$820,820,000. The 1911 crop exceeded the 1910 production by 4,153,387 bales and sold for \$87,900,000 less.

There are 167,866 acres of cultivated land in Colorado county and 42,198 acres are devoted to the production of cotton. The record shows that 25 per cent of our improved farm land is devoted to cotton and it has been the predominating crop ever since the county was settled.

Colorado county produced 20,570 bales of cotton in 1911, which sold for \$925,650, against 17,098 bales in 1910, which sold for \$1,162,664, making an increase of 3,472 bales and a decrease in the value of \$237,014. The average farm value of cotton was \$29.00 per bale less in 1910 than in 1911.—Commercial Secretaries.
