Will T. Bagby of Hallettsville, anti-prohibition leader of the House, (the last Legislature, passed through Houston Friday, leaving in the evening for Marlin to confer with Gov. Colquitt on legislative matters.

Bagby was questioned with reference to whether he would become a candidate for senatorial honors in the senatorial district comprising Lavaca, Fayette, Austin and Colorado Counties, to which he replied:

"I had not intended to become a candidate, but the importuning of my friends will very likely cause me to do so. I am on my way to see Gov. Colquitt at Marlin about some legislative matters, and in the meantime I will consider the matter."

Senator D. A. Paulus will resign shortly, it is understood, and this will leave a vacancy to be filled before the extra session.

It is probable, however, that if the Governor and his friends desire Mr. Bagby to remain on the floor of the House, that he will do so. — Houston Post.

EXPECTING GOOD PRICES

Prominent Spud Grower Can't See Why Spuds Will be Cheap.

Mr. John W. Burns, one of the big potato growers of this section, dropped into our office Tuesday for a short business visit. Mr. Burns says while the potato crop is badly in need of rain, considering the severe drought and high winds, the potatoes are holding their own remarkably well. He says it is very likely that the crop will be a big one. Mr. Burns, who is a member of the local school board, visited the potato section of Wharton county last week. In that section, he says, the spuds are not looking as good as here, that a frost as late as April 11th, which missed here by three degrees, did great damage through a portion of that vicinity. Mr. Burns says he can't see what will cause potatoes to sell at a low price this season, as so many people are expecting. For, he says, the Florida crop will be off the market by the time the crop begins to move here and that the old crop potatoes are already getting so soft now that there is scarcely any demand for them. Mr. Burns says, however, if we don't get rain over the potato section in a very few days, that we will not ship half the crop that was shipped out of here last year, even in the face of a twenty-five percent increase in acreage in the Eagle Lake section this year over last season.
