Hanging of Diggs Perry at Bay City for Murder

Bay City, Texas, April 21.—Diggs Perry, a negro, paid the extreme penalty of the law this afternoon when he was hanged here for the murder last September of Jack Simmons, an aged man of his own race. Perry was to have been hanged on March 17th, but Governor Colquitt granted a respite of thirty days. In the interim the board of pardon advisers investigated the case and reported unfavorably on a petition for commutation to life imprisonment. The execution of Perry was the first hanging in this county in thirty years. Sheriff Frank Ruggely officiated at the anterior execution—the hanging of three negroes—and at the hanging of Perry today.

Perry was hanged in a barn owned by a local farmer. A large crowd congregated. He took his plight very coolly and protested his innocence to the end. He claimed he was the victim of circumstances and had been falsely accused.

With a final word of goodby he signified his readiness to accept his doom, and a hymn was sung by his friends.

The trap was sprung at 1:10 o'clock and at 1:30 he was pronounced dead. The hanging was quiet and orderly.

The crime for which Perry was executed was revolting in character. The record in the District Court of Matagorda county, in which he was convicted, shows that the old man, Jack Simmons, was shot and robbed of \$35 and then thrown into his own fire place to burn. Two other negroes were arrested with Perry.

TRAINED TO REAR CHILDREN

Branch of Nursing Which Has to Do With Care of Infants Now a Profession.

The branch of nursing which has to do with the care of little children was inaugurated as a profession in England about twenty years ago, the Norland institute in London having the honor of being the pioneer training school of the kind.

The Nursery college curriculum includes, besides nursery management, domestic work, hygiene and needlework. Of the one year required to complete the training at the Norland institute, thirteen weeks are spent in one of the London children's hospitals; three months in practical nursing, and the remaining time at institutional work.

Children of from one month up to nine years of age are admitted at the Norland institute. These children are, for the most part, the children of officers in the foreign service, widows, colonials, trustees, guardians, people of the theatrical profession. The cost of such an institution was the highest duty of the birth.

To those interested in nursery life a visit to the Norland institute is inspirational. Besides the college, with its nurseries, its lecture hall, its workroom, where the uniforms are made and other interesting studies, there is the Norland Seaside nurseries at Bognor, where the children under the charge of the institute may go for rest and change.—Christian Herald.
