

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Issuance of Bonds for the Purpose of the Construction of the Necessary Buildings for the University of Texas and Also for Buildings of Various Institutions, and Authorizing Improvement Bonds for the Purpose of Navigation, Irrigation, Construction of Bridges and the Maintenance and Operation of Public Warehouses.

To be entitled A Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same for public improvements.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to wit:

Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection and defend the State in war or pay existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in current revenues shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. The Legislature, however, shall have power to authorize the issuance of bonds to be approved by the Governor, for the purpose of purchasing additional ground and erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas, including a medical department, an Agricultural and Mechanical College and all departments and activities of a complete university of the first class. The revenue received from the permanent University fund shall be available for the payment of interest on these bonds and for the creation of a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity and the Legislature shall also have power to issue bonds for the construction of

so have the power to authorize the issuance of bonds secured by lien on real property of the penitentiary system to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of constructing buildings and making permanent improvements.

Section 52. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize any county, city, town or any other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of or to any individual association or corporation whatsoever or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company; provided, however, that under Legislative provisions any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties or any political subdivision of the State or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be effected thereby in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except in case of improvement of rivers, creeks and streams, in building of levees to prevent overflows, in which case the bonded indebtedness may be for an amount not to exceed one-half of the assessed valuation of the lands of the district to be reclaimed; and, except, further, that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the legislature may, within the limits and in such manner as it may authorize in the following purposes, to wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof or irrigation therefrom or in aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and water ways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of bridges and macadamized, graveled, sandy clay, or clayed sand or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof.

(d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses or in aid thereof.

SEC. 2. The foregoing amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for adoption or rejection at a special election hereby ordered for the third Saturday in July, 1913, the same being the nineteenth day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following:

For amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

Against amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products.

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the County Judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of the voters in each county on which he shall have printed the form of the ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of the voters.

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State; The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said Proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

CHASES BUTTERFLY YEARS

Entomologist Traps 25,000 Miles for
Purpose of Catching One Red-
Spotted Bug.

A telegram from Chicago revealed the interesting story of a 25,000-mile chase for a butterfly, told by Mrs. William Carleton Yange, wife of an English entomologist connected with the French Institute of Entomology, who is on her way to join her husband in New York. Mrs. Yange said her husband had made the journey of 25,000 miles for the sole purpose of catching one butterfly, one insignificant, long, red-spotted bug belonging to the Bombyx family, which is said to be nearly as numerous as the population of China. Mrs. Yange said: "We have had the most extraordinary good fortune. The actual classification of the butterfly I do not know, but I know he has two spots in each upper wing, when rendered him exceedingly desirable. Moreover, he is snugly done up in a tin box hermetically sealed, and

whose collections lack this particular specimen. We have been butterfly chasing from Paris to Kyoto, and we got our little Bombyx in the garden of a Japanese gentleman's residence at Kyoto after pursuing him twelve months." Some of the butterflies of this continent are the blue, sulphur, cabbage, angelwing, painted lady, zebra swallowtail, silverspot, peacock, wood swallowtail, wood nymph, milkweed, tiger swallowtail, mourning cloak and red-spotted purple. The naturalist could not at first find the Bombyx or the kind of a butterfly he sought, but he did not cease his search nor his journey around the world till he had found his specimen.—Christian Herald.

THE PHRASE "HOME RULE."

In view of the passage of the home rule bill by the house of commons it is interesting to recall the beginning of that movement. According to Barry O'Brien, author of "The Life of Charles Stewart Parnell," it was at a meeting at the Bilton hotel, Dublin, in 1870, that the movement was launched, and it was Isaac Butt, counsel for the Fenian prisoners, who invented the phrase "home rule." He thought these words reasonable and innocent, while the old cry of "repeal" would frighten the English.
