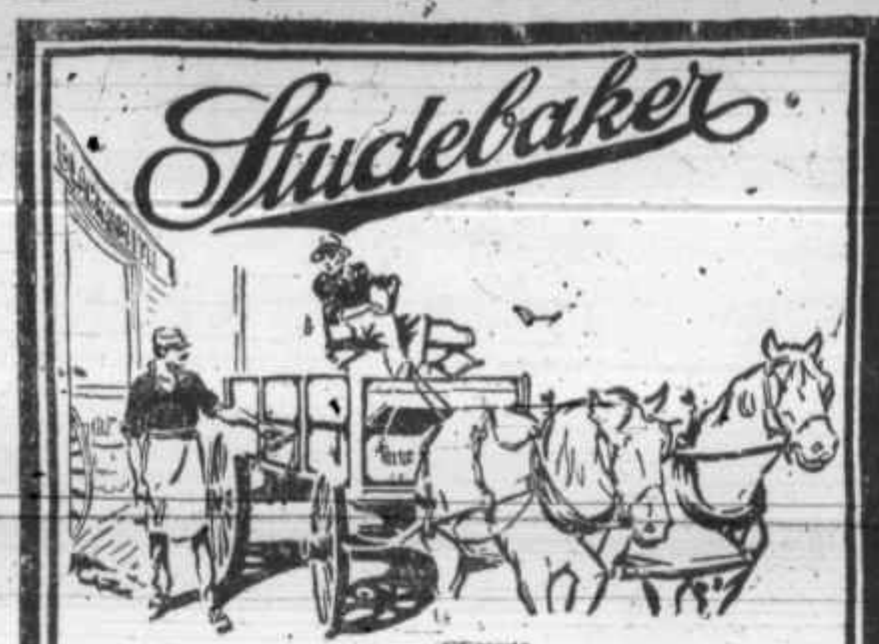

KAISER PLANS NEW CANAL
Contemplates Building a Waterway From the Rhine River to the North Sea.

The decision of the Belgian government to build a great canal from Antwerp to Liege, in order to supply that port with Belgian coal in place of the English article, has been seized upon in Germany as a strong argument for building a canal from the lower Rhine along the Dutch frontier to the North sea at Emden.

It is suggested in this connection that the Belgian canal be extended from Liege to the Rhine, thus making a great internal waterway from Antwerp to Emden.

At a recent meeting of the budget committee of the Prussian diet the minister of public works and railways said the government was deeply interested in the Rhine-Emden project, and this remark has given the friends of it renewed hope for its realization.

They argue that the new canal must be made spacious enough to accommodate vessels of 6,000 tons, in fully with the Rhine, which can carry vessels of only 3,000 tons.

Of course the chief argument for building a "connection" from the Rhine to the Belgian canal at Liege is that it would give much cheaper transportation for German iron and steel to the seaboard. Antwerp is the chief exporting point for German steel, but the long railway haul is a great handicap to the export business. —New York Tribune.

SHOOTS WIFE AND SELF
Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Chatham Killed By Bullets at San Benito.

San Benito, Tex., April 29.—T. E. Chatham, a local transfer man, late this afternoon shot and instantly killed his wife and then killed himself at the Chatham home. Three or four shots were fired at Mrs. Chatham, while Chatham put one bullet through his own brain.

Domestic troubles were the cause of the tragedy. Chatham and his wife had been separated about two months and divorce proceedings were pending. Mrs. Chatham, with her mother and little son occupied the house where the shooting occurred. The two latter were at home at the time of the trouble today.

What directly precipitated the shooting is not known. Chatham, with some Mexicans, went to the home of his wife to move a piano. Mrs. Chatham, who had been in the home of neighbors across the street, was advised of the intention to move the piano. She went home while the Mexicans were taking the piano from the house, according to them. Chatham communicated to his wife by writing on a piece of paper. Mrs. Chatham's answer was in the negative. Then, witnesses say, Chatham began firing.

Mrs. Chatham's lifeless body was found a few minutes later lying near the steps, she having evidently fled after the first shot. With a revolver in his hand Chatham was found dead, lying on a bed in a back room.

T. E. Chatham came here from Kingsville about two years ago. For awhile he was local station agent for the Frisco. He is a native of Georgia. Chatham has a brother in San Antonio, also a brother and sisters in Houston. He was 40 years old.

A letter addressed to Scott Brown, Chatham's employer, was found in Chatham's pocket. This letter related to his domestic troubles and expressed regret for what he intended to do. It was dated April 19. In this letter Chatham contended he loved his wife and expected to meet her in heaven.

Mrs. Chatham was a native of Texas, having been born in Gonzales County. She has relatives in Wharton, Hungerford, Houston and San Benito. Her mother, Mrs. J. J. McCallum of Hungerford, is now visiting here. Mrs. Chatham was 38 years of age.

The couple leave two sons—Lee, the younger, who is here, and Don, a grown son, in San Antonio.—San Antonio Express.

The Chatham family lived in Eagle Lake many years ago, having moved here from Columbus about the year 1880.

BUOYS LIGHTED BY WIRELESS
German Inventor Declares That Currents Properly Attended 'Will Turn on the Light.'

A German inventor, Grimmelshausen, claims to have found a method for using wireless waves in the best manner for lighting up distant lamps, either electric or gas lamps, by the use of an accurately tuned wireless receiver at each lamp so that it is sensitive to only one wave pitch and no others.

The wireless waves act upon a receiver combined with a local relay for working an electromagnetic switch so as to turn on the current or gas as the case may be.

This idea is in itself not a new one, as we are already familiar with wireless distant control devices, but the originality lies in the close tuning of the receivers so that only a given wave frequency will work them. The device will thus be a valuable one for seacoast lights, and especially for light buoys.

Before this sea cables were run from the buoys to shore so as to stand the severe strain of the waves on the new plan a battery can be used in the buoy, and the current be turned on by wireless.

Please Don't Publish

Every newspaper is familiar with the request, "Please do not publish anything about it." Sometimes it is made in the form of a demand and accompanied by threats of dire results if acquiescence does not follow.

There are a few things, the Louisville Herald says, the public ought to keep in mind in the matter of a newspaper's relation to the printing of news:

In the first place a newspaper owes an obligation to its whole circle of readers to print a fair, comprehensive report of the day's happenings. It cannot overlook this responsibility merely to please individuals. That policy involved an injustice to the many and favoritism to the few. Who shall be favored?

Much of the news that is printed unfortunately occasions annoyance and often heartache to the individual.

Persons who wish to escape publicity should be careful not to make news, or should count the cost of advertisement to the work as part of the price they must pay for what they have determined upon doing.

There are certain easily defined zones of publicity. The individual who steps into any of these may count upon getting his name in the newspapers. One is the courts, civil and criminal. The man who goes to law invites advertisement. Yet many men—and sometimes women—appeal to a newspaper to suppress reports of legal proceedings in order that they may be saved annoyance. The time to consider immunity is before resort to law.

Departure from the conventionalities of life is another means of entering the publicity zone. Conduct that is off the beaten trail affords news. Those who defy social observances or tread upon established institutions must not expect to escape print, and should not ask to be saved from such notoriety.

Further, much injustice may be done by the suppression of news. The tongue of gossip, uninformed of the real facts, can do a hundred times more injury to the innocent than publication of the truth will do to those actually involved. Often a newspaper is shielding the reputation of a score from the "scandal of suspicion when it is telling the truth about one who has incurred the liability to censure.

A newspaper, with a sense of responsibility, will exercise certain discrimination. There may be times and circumstances that justify suppression. Some happenings may in the reporting of them serve no proper end. Of two things the responsible newspaper will be jealously careful—the good name of a woman and the reputation of a financial institution.

Both are of that delicacy to be easily hurt. The good name of a woman is treasure beyond price, and a cloud cast upon the reputation of a bank or trust company may cause loss to thousands who are dependent upon its solvency.

But this lesson the public should learn—the way to avoid publicity is to avoid departure from the beaten track; and let this be added to it—if you have diverged into the danger zone the way to obtain considerable treatment is to assume that you are a subject for news, and to take the newspapers into your confidence frankly and fully.

Such confidence is very rarely abused and assuredly never by any newspaper that makes profession of decency or has regard for ethics.
