PURCHASE A GRAVEL PIT

City Makes Purchase and Will Begin Improving Streets Throughout City.

The city of Eagle Lake has purchased the gravel pit of Mr. B. L. Vineyard west of town and joining the city's former pit. This new gravel bed is said to contain some mighty fine gravel which will be especially fine for road work. The city, as soon as the deal for this gravel is closed up, will begin a campaign of road

work. The city roads are in sore need of work and improvements and the city now proposes to put all the city roads and streets in the very best of condition that the finances will permit. The streets will be graded up and then covered with the clay and gravel from the new pit which, when properly done, will put them in good condition. For some time past the city has done but little work on the streets. This, however, was due to the fact that so many concrete crossings had to be put in that there was no money left for road work, but now that practically all the crossings have been built of concrete, making them almost indestructible and requiring but little expense to keep them up, the city will turn its attention towards road improvements.

LIGHTNING KILLING TREES

Prominent Planter States that Lightning is Killing Many Pecan Trees.

Mr. F. P. Herbert, while in the city from his plantation this week, stated that a great many of the pecan trees through the bottoms are being killed by lightning. He says more than a hundred trees on his farm alone have been killed and injured during the past two or three years. Mr. Herbert's explanation of this is that so much of the timber land has been cleared up of all except the pecan trees during the last several years, which leaves only the pecan trees standing in the fields and exposes them to the lightning, they being struck almost during every electrical storm. Some of the trees after being hit by lightning, Mr. Herbert says, die within a day or two, others linger for some time and others are only partially killed. It is said that after a pecan tree is once struck by lightning the tree is of very little use after that is a nut producer.

Promiscuous Shooting Saturday Night at Matthews Causes Injury to Two.

Will Ordiner, white, who lives near Columbus and William Upson, colored farmer of this community, were accidentally shot on last Saturday night. The shooting took place near the "Forty Four" saloon at Matthews. Ordiner was killed by a shot from his knees to the top of his head and Upson was struck

shot. Joe Williams, a Mexican and Hamp Wade, a negro, were arrested and fined \$20 each. They claimed that the shooting was accidental, they being at long range and were shooting the gun promiscuously. Owing to the distance, none of the shot buried deep into the flesh and Ordiner and Upson were only slightly wounded.
