## SPEND MILLIONS FOR FEED

Over Eleven Million Spent An-  
nually by Texas Farmers  
for Feed Stuff.

The farmers of Texas do not  
raise enough cereals and forage  
crops for their own farm animals.  
They expend, according to a re-  
cent census report issued by the  
Federal Department of Com-  
merce and Labor, \$10,800,000 an-  
nually for feed stuff. The official  
figures show that twenty-seven  
per cent of the farmers buy feed.  
Peter Radford, President of the  
Farmers' Union, in discuss-  
ing the subject, said: "A farm-  
er should, as a rule, raise his  
own feed. While cotton is our  
money crop and the moisture re-  
quirements of cotton and cereals  
are in a measure antagonistic,  
and nature usually favors cotton  
yet a farmer should plant enough  
feed to take his stock through  
the season."

The farmers of Colorado coun-  
ty expend \$4,775 annually for  
feedstuffs. 555 of the farmers  
of this county report purchases  
of feedstuffs and the annual ex-  
penditure per farm reporting is  
\$82. By proper diversification  
of crops this money can be kept  
at home.
