LARGE CROWD AT RECITAL

Annual Recital of the Beethoven
Musical Club Friday Night
at High School.

An audience of almost five
hundred greeted the Beethoven
Musical Club at its annual recital
under the supervision of the
director, Miss Bessie Lena Yates,
in the auditorium of the high
school building last Friday night.

Miss Lucia Mae Tom of the
Cincinnati Conservatory of mu-
sic, a gifted soloist, was the
crowning feature of this rare
musical treat.

The perfect stage setting added
a charming grace to the oc-
casion. The softened radiance
of light, trembling through lacey
ferns and slumbering on waxen
lilies and fringed carnations,
while over all floated the elusive
alluring fragrance of great, half
opened magnolia buds, created
an atmosphere that needed but
the fitting presence of the young
singers, and the touch of
their fairy music to call up the
land enchanted.

given in the characteristic and
altogether pleasing style peculiar
to the several performers.

Miss Yates was at her best and
delighted the audience with her
phrasing as well as by her gracious
manner and ability as a director.
Miss Tom in her first selection
won her hearers by the magnif-
icent volume and range of her
voice, her pure tones and per-
fect enunciation. Her render-
ing of "If I Were a Rose" showed
a sympathetic sweetness and
depth of feeling that the audience
did not fail to appreciate. She
was compelled to respond to sev-
eral encores.

when claimed by death. She had

whom join the grief stricken fam-
ily in sincere sorrow for her

ily residence on Dallas avenue
from which funeral services were
held this afternoon at 4 o'clock
in the presence of a large con-
course of people who had come

Taxpayers Use Surplus.

The workings of a firm hand
and a clear brain in the Treasury
department are manifest in the
announcement that Secretary
McAdoo will transfer \$10,000,000
from the treasury to banks and
will henceforth exact 2 per cent
interest on all federal deposits.
This design is alike acceptable to
bankers, to business men of ev-
ery class and to the public at
large. It gives additional stabili-
ty to the finances of the country
by increasing bank deposits. It
confirms governmental rights by
compensation of the government
for its deposits so made. It puts
money in circulation and it sup-
plies the taxpayer with a method
which enables him to have the
use of surplus money contribut-
ed by him to the federal treasury
and which would otherwise lie
idle.—Buffalo Times.
