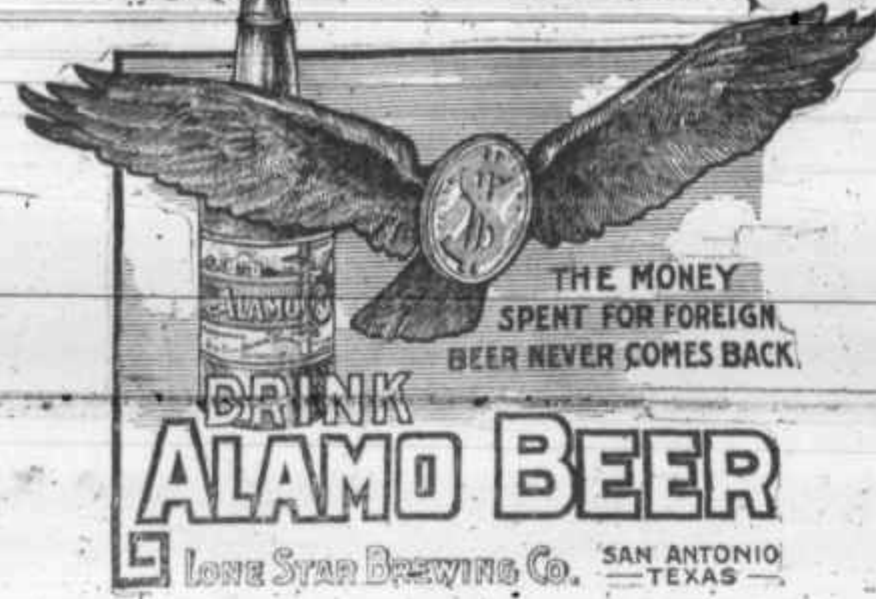

An Ordinance Prohibiting the Riding, Driving or Operating of any Animal, Automobile, Motorcycle, Bicycle, Tricycle, Velocipede or Roller Skates Along or Upon any Sidewalk Within the Corporate Limits of the City of Eagle Lake, Colorado County Texas. And Providing a Penalty.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EAGLE LAKE: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to drive, ride or operate an animal, automobile, motorcycle, bicycle, tricycle, velocipede or roller skates along or upon any sidewalk within the Corporate Limits of the City of Eagle Lake, Colorado County, Texas, and any person or persons violating any part or parts of the foregoing ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than One Dollar, nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

All ordinances, and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be, and the same are hereby repealed. Approved in regular session of City Council May the 20th, 1913. P. P. Putney, Mayor, Eagle Lake, Texas. Attested: R. E. Walker, Sec., Eagle Lake, Texas.

REV. WM. NICKEL'S SHOT

Was Shot Three Times in Difficulty at Glen Flora on Thursday of Last Week.

On Thursday night of last week, or late in the afternoon, at the depot in Glen Flora, Rev. Wm. Nickel and John H. Dorman engaged in a difficulty in which Mr. Nickel received four pistol wounds. He was shot in the right shoulder, left arm, right knee and in the lower stomach. Only three shots were fired, one ball passing through the right arm and entering the stomach. It is said that he is now considered out of danger, and all wounds proved to be only flesh wounds.

The two men are brothers-in-law, and both are well known in Eagle Lake, both having formerly lived here. Mr. Nickel was formerly pastor of the Methodist church at this place, and Mr. Dorman, with his parents' family formerly lived here, moving to Glen Flora a number of years ago.

No particulars of the difficulty have been learned here. Both men are well, and favorably known throughout this community and the trouble is deeply regretted.

Rev. R. H. Jones of Norfolk, Virginia, will arrive in the city tomorrow to begin his work here as pastor for the Christian church. He will preach his first sermon here Sunday morning, and will also hold services at the evening hour. Rev. Mr. Jones comes to this church highly recommended as a preacher.
