Mule Raising an Important In- dustry.

The Texas mule is gaining in
prominence every day in the
year, and the raising of these
animals is becoming an import-
ant industry in Colorado County.
It is estimated that twenty per-
cent of the mules that are being
used in the building of the Pan-
ama Canal were bred in Texas,
and in selecting material for his
cavalry, Gen. Sam favors the
Texas mule.

There are 4292 mules on the
farms and ranges of Colorado
County according to a recent
census bulletin and their total
value is \$375,625; of this number
3983 are mature mules, 227 are
yearling colts and 82 spring colts.
Besides the mules on the farms
of this County there are 175 of
these animals owned by the
urban population which have a
value of \$14,570.

The State is divided into
four districts and the following
follows: 675,558 rural and 33,073
urban. The value to the mules
on the farms and ranges of Tex-
as is \$73,979,145 and those in the
cities and villages of the State is
\$4,123,183. Commercial Secre-

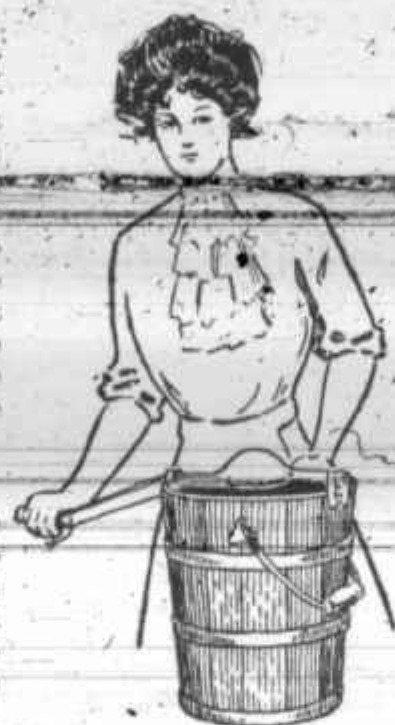
