What Became of Wilkes Booth?

What became of Wilkes Booth, the murderer of President Lincoln? Was he shot by Boston Corbett in the Virginia barn to which he had been tracked after he fled from Ford's Theater, Washington, immediately following the assassination? If this man was Wilkes Booth, why was there so much mystery regarding the burial? It is hard to believe otherwise, yet many statements have been made which conflict with the killing of Booth and the burning of the tobacco barn as given out by the Government.

One of these stories was to the effect that Booth had escaped south through the country which would naturally have been friendly to him, and, changing his name, became an Episcopal minister. There are those who knew the Southern clergyman and who knew the Booth family, that he possessed Wilkes Booth's ungovernable temper and love for liquor, and that he also had his mannerisms and was lame in the leg. Booth broke his leg when he fell from the box immediately after he had shot the President.

It is said that this same clergyman had, upon several occasions hinted that he was Wilkes Booth. The rumor being circulated among his congregation, the minister found it advisable to move further south, and a newspaper interview in the year 1893 tells that the mysterious clergyman was once secretly visited in a Georgia town by Edwin Booth, and that the two were closeted in private conversation for hours.

Another story relates that Booth was able to escape through all the Southern States until he reached Mexico, being disguised as a Confederate soldier. This seems highly improbable, for in the South at the time only a little precaution would have been necessary for him to have found a safe conveyance to whatever section he might desire to go. F. W. Bates, a Tennessee lawyer, some years ago wrote a book, in which he said he met a man in Texas in 1868 who confessed to being Wilkes Booth, and that this man later killed himself at Enid, Ok.

In 1903 a New Jersey actress affirmed that she was the daughter of Wilkes Booth, and that her mother was a Kentucky woman whom Booth had married in the early '70s, having assumed the name of David E. George. But the most mysterious part of her story was that her father said that after his escape he was compelled to hide for a long period in the Kentucky mountains, and it would seem that such a thing would have been unnecessary.

The story as told of the capture of Booth, was to the effect that the barn in which he and his companions had taken shelter was surrounded by thirty picked cavalrymen, who were compelled to burn it to get him. This seems a rather awkward statement when considering the fact that thirty "picked cavalrymen" were not able to capture one wounded man. It does not seem that it would have been such a difficult task to have surrounded the barn on all sides and to have caught the man by making an entry at different points without any harm to themselves, desperate as he may have been.

But the most mysterious part of the whole procedure seems to have been as to the disposition made of Booth's body, if it was Booth who was killed in the tobacco barn. It was months after the assassination before any

thing definite was heard as to what was done to the body. Then an officer came forward with the statement that it had been sunk in the Potomac at night. Other men claimed proof that it had been cremated. More authoritatively, it is said that the murderer was buried in a Government prison. Then many persons began boldly to assert that he had never been captured or shot, and if any one had been killed in the tobacco barn it was more than likely some skulking tramp.

The Government statement was to the effect that after Booth's body had been carried to a gunboat it was secretly removed and a few years later it was turned over to the actor, Edwin Booth, who had it interred in Green Mount Cemetery at Baltimore. In 1903 one of the pallbearers at the funeral said: "The body buried in Green Mount Cemetery was not that of Booth. There were never two persons who resembled each other less, and I knew Booth all my life. I saw the body several times." There is a mystery somewhere between the assassination of President Lincoln and the drawing of the curtain in the life of Wilkes Booth.—Dallas News.
