Eldridge's Plan Good

To the Editor of the Chronicle: I have been reading with much interest the various discussions of prison management. It is my belief that the plan outlined by W. T. Eldridge comes nearer to the mark than any of them. I will also say that Mr. Eldridge has had a better chance to learn the ways of state prisoners than any other man in the state. I will go further and say he did more for their comfort and spent more money in trying to make conditions easy for them than any man who ever worked them.

I went to work for the state in 1879, when T. J. Goree was superintendent and the prison was leased to Cunningham & Ellis, and worked under Goree, Rice and Baker. When Whitley was superintendent I was not working for the state. At that time I had a firm belief that there is no good reason why the state can not make the prison system self-sustaining.

You must put a man in charge who has had experience in the business. Then do not tie his hands. There is no necessity to mistreat prisoners. But when a man is found guilty the jury doesn't say: "We, the jury, find the defendant guilty and assess his punishment at five years in the penitentiary at play." However, this is about what it has been for the last few years.
