ROAD DRAG DAYS IN IOWA

Two Iowa towns recently put
themselves before the public as
wile awake leaders in the good
roads movement and received a
lot of well earned distinction
though neither is more than two
thousand in number. Each of
these hustling little cities, inde-
pendent of the other, inaugurat-
ed a road drag day, one being
held on the last day of April and
the other on the first day of May.

Stuart was the first to co-op-
erate with the ruralists in an ef-
fort to have all roads leading in-
to it dragged on a certain day.
Quite a list of premiums had
been advertised, inducements be-
ing offered to each farmer who
came from outside the city lim-
its on a road drag and returned
thereon, no matter how short the
distance. Special prizes were
also offered to the man coming
the longest distance, as well as
to the man coming the longest
distance on a road drag, the sec-
ond longest distance and the
third longest distance, as well
as to the man driving the

heaviest four-horse team and to
the man having the best drag-
this to be decided by the con-
testants themselves.

Each road dragger had to re-
port on his drag to the com-
mercial club secretary, who issued
each a certificate which was good
at fifteen stores for 25 cents in
trade as well as a pound of cof-
fee, a tie, hair tonic, bottle of ol-
ives, a ring of hologna, a glass of
mustard, and a dish of ice cream
and drinks at the fountain. Apart
from this the bank provided all
the road dragger with dinner
and the feed yard man fed all the
teams free of charge.

The first drag to arrive in
town was that owned by a high
school boy who had driven six
miles and who drove onto Main
Street at 7 a. m., while the last
of the men to receive his certifi-
cate arrived at just 12 o'clock,
having driven ten miles. Twen-
ty-four drags and 117 teams
traded mark on the various roads
leading into town, several of the
roads having been dragged two
or three times, a total distance of
one hundred miles having been
traveled by the entire delegation
and guests of the town. It may
thus be seen that before the
drags reached home there would
be considerable road work done.

The special prizes were all well
earned, the cash prize for com-
ing the longest distance being
awarded to a man living ten and
one-half miles south of Stuart,
the second longest distance prize
going to a man living ten miles
southeast of Stuart, and the
third longest distance prize go-
ing to a man living nine miles
north of town. Here is another
interesting fact in that the roads
in the different directions were
dragged for a considerable
length. The heaviest four-horse
team weighed 6,730 pounds,
while the next closest rival
weighed 6,180 pounds. The list
of prizes did not end here, how-
ever, as the appearance of two
young women—one the daughter
of a wealthy farmer—driving in-
to town on a road drag made it
necessary for the merchants
hurriedly to get together and ar-
range prizes for the young wo-

Club was planning its Road Drag
Day the editor of the Mount Ayr
"Record-News" was busy with a
similar plan in mind, and in his
issue of April 18 announced his
intention of giving 200 note-heads
and 200 envelopes to every far-
mer who dragged his road be-
tween his place and Mt. Ayr and
return on Drag Day, the station-
ery worth \$1.50. The idea evi-
dently found favor with many of
the business men, as in the is-
sue dated April 29 there was
quite a nice list of additional
prizes including the following:
four handkerchiefs, one pound of
coffee, jar of shoe cream, a 14-
galvanized iron pail, a box of ax-
le grease, a buggy whip, a pack-
age of poultry food, a necktie,
a pair of dress hose, an aluminum
stew kettle, a ten-pound sack of
meal, besides 25 cents to 50 cents
in trade at various stores.

On the day set aside as Drag
Day they came into town one
two, three or more at a time.
The first man arrived before 7
o'clock in the morning and the
last arrived after 6 o'clock in the
evening. By eleven o'clock six-
ty-four drags were gathered on
the square, while the last drag
to arrive brought the total num-
ber up to an even hundred. As
work was pressing at home,
many drove in and remained on-
ly long enough to get their pre-
miums, returning to their work
just as soon as possible. One of
the good roads enthusiasts was
a mere lad of twelve years who
drove three large horses from
his home nine miles out.

Quoting from a letter from the
editor of the "Record-News," we
have the following:

"As a net result of Drag Day
the farmers have been convinced
that dragging will benefit the
roads no matter how dry they
may be. On Thursday morning,
May 1, the roads were dry, hard
and rough and in the evening
they were as smooth as pave-
ment. Several who were averse
to dragging were on hand to get
their premiums and it is the gen-
eral opinion that they have been
converted." The co-operative
spirit among farmers and busi-
ness men has been greatly en-
hanced. We never have done
anything that created more good
roads enthusiasm than did the
drag demonstration."

Such a big turnout of drags
and draggers was hardly expect-
ed and as a result several of the
stores ran out of their advertised
premiums, necessitating the tak-
ing of orders for future delivery.
A general good feeling was every-
where in evidence. Everyone
seemed to be highly enthusiastic,
thereby demonstrating that
there was strength in the co-op-
eration existing between the
farmers who make Mount Ayr
their trading point and the busi-
ness men of the county seat. The
number of drags in town on Drag
Day is enough evidence that the
farmers mean business and that
there was really more interest
manifested by the busy farmers
on this one day than could usual-
ly be aroused in a month in many
Iowa towns that call themselves

Breeder's Gazette.

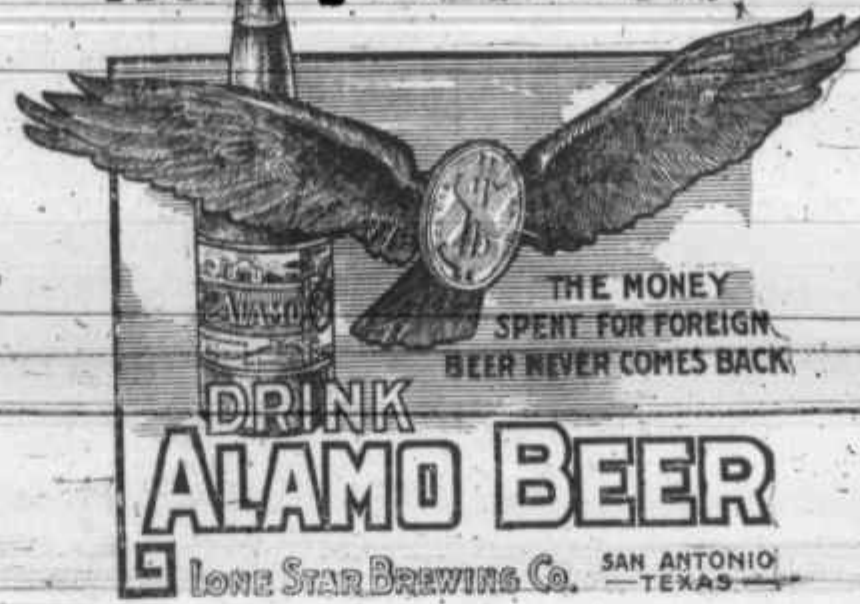

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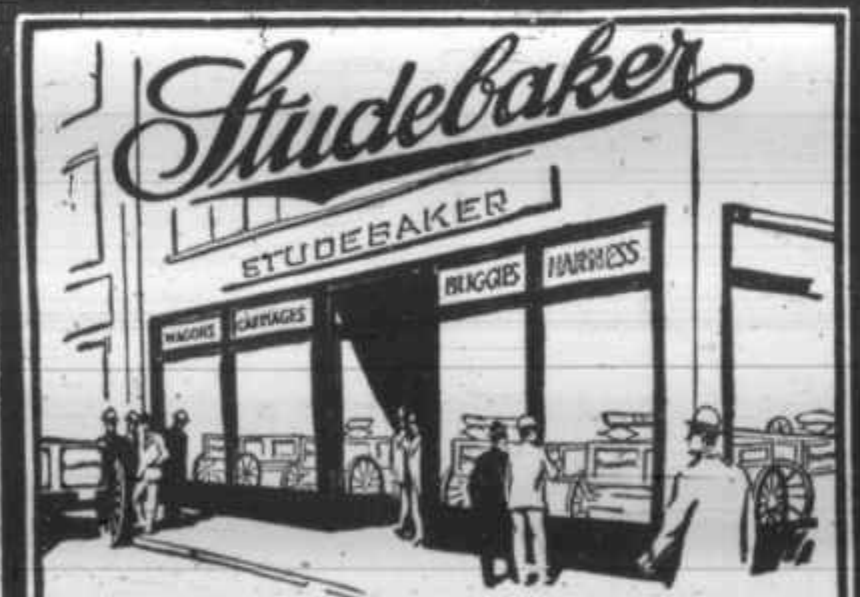
