Colorado County Tax Rate

The Court levied the following taxes for Colorado County for the year 1913.

First: An occupation tax equal to one half of that levied by the State is hereby levied except where the State levies for the benefit of the County a specific amount, and except liquor and malt dealers. It is ordered that an occupation tax of \$150.00 be levied upon all liquor dealers and a tax of \$25.00 upon all malt dealers for said year.

Second: An ad valorem tax is hereby levied upon all property upon which the State levies an ad valorem tax of fifteen cents on each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property, excepting such property where the State levies a specific amount for the benefit of the County.

Third: A poll tax of twenty-five cents upon all persons residing within the County, upon whom the State levies a poll tax, is hereby levied.

Fourth: An ad valorem tax of twenty-three cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in said county, for the Road and Bridge Fund.

Fifth: An ad valorem tax of two cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in said county for Special Bridge Fund No. 2.

Sixth: An ad valorem tax of two cents is levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in said county, for the Court House and Jail Fund.

Seventh: An ad valorem tax of twenty cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within School District No. 22, for special school tax fund in said district.

Eighth: An ad valorem tax of forty cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within school district No. 40, for special school tax fund in said district.

Ninth: An ad valorem tax of ten cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within school district No. 14, for special school tax fund in said district.

Tenth: An ad valorem tax of twenty-five cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within school district No. 5, for special school tax fund in said district.

Eleventh: An ad valorem tax of twenty-five cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within school district No. 7, for special school tax fund in said district.

Twelfth: An ad valorem tax of fifteen cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within school district No. 38, for special school tax fund in said district.

Thirteenth: An ad valorem tax of fifty cents is hereby levied upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within New Hope county line district No. 40 of Wharton county, composed of territory of Wharton and Colorado counties on Turkey Creek, on all the property situated in Colorado county, for special school tax fund in said district.

More Silos Needed in Colorado County.

The Farmers' Union has been conducting an exhaustive investigation into agricultural condition with reference to the cost of producing and value received for farm crops with a view of recommending a substitute for cotton as that industry is already suffering from over-production. In discussing the subject, President Radford of the Farmers' Union said: "The Lord made the greater part of Texas a cotton country and it will always remain the money crop of Texas so long as the farmer markets his crop direct from the harvest field, but I believe with plenty of good livestock and a silo a farmer can successfully raise feed stuff and he will be justified in planting less cotton and raising more livestock."

The Federal Census reports show that we have 14,080,936 head of livestock in Texas, and domestic animals.

There were 2210 farms in Colorado county that reported livestock when the Thirteenth Census was taken according to a report just issued by the Federal Department of Commerce and Labor and the total number of domestic animals on these farms numbered 68,171, which has a combined value of \$1,478,598. Cattle is the predominating class of livestock in this county as shown by the following table:

A LARGE DEAL IN CATTLE

Eagle Lake Cattle Man Swings \$100,000 Cattle Trade.

Mr. A. M. McDow, Eagle Lake's largest and most extensive cattle man, this week closed a deal with Col. J. H. Jackson, of Chambers county for the entire Jackson stock of 3000 cattle and horses, which included five thousand and one hundred and thirty horses, involving the sum of \$100,000. Mr. McDow gets the grazing privilege in the deal, and the Jacksons will pasture this stock in Chambers county.

This is one of the largest cattle deals involved here for a long time. Mr. McDow is one of the most extensive cattle men of this section, and what he doesn't know about cattle is not worth knowing. He thoroughly understands the business and is constantly swinging some big deals in cattle trade.
