Consolidated School Census

Columbus, Texas, June 10.—County Superintendent C. K. Quin today finished the consolidated school census rolls for Colorado county including the independent districts for the school year beginning September 1st, and is as follows:

Eagle Lake	339	252	611
Columbus	108	285	453

TOTAL	2813	2394	5407

The above shows an increase on the county rolls over last year of 165. Columbus and Eagle Lake each have an increase of 34 over the rolls of last year, while Alleyton has an increase of 2. Total of increase for county and independent districts over last year being 235. The totals for last year were, county rolls 5242, Eagle Lake 577, Columbus 419, and Alleyton 177.

The month in which to file the rolls with the State Superintendent, but by systematic arrangement and promptness to duty, he succeeded in getting them ready 12 days earlier than the time required by law. He is probably the first of the County Superintendents in the state to get this work finished.
