HURT IN RUNAWAY SUNDAY

Mrs. W. A. Dallas Injured in Runaway Accident Last Sunday.

Mrs. W. A. Dallas was quite painfully injured by being thrown from a buggy in a runaway at about five o'clock last Sunday afternoon. The horse was Mrs. Dallas' riding horse, but was unaccustomed to being driven. Mrs. Dallas got into the buggy at the Hotel Dallas and the horse started at full speed up McCarty avenue. Mrs. Dallas gave for a moment lost self control, but was pulling and saw-sawing on the reins with all her might endeavoring to check the frightened animal. When the horse was between the residences of Capt. Ziegler and S. O. McCarty he made a sudden turn into the McCarty fence, the short and quick turn throwing Mrs. Dallas from the buggy violently to the ground, rendering her unconscious for a few seconds. She was taken into the home of her parents, Capt. and Mrs. Ziegler, the accident occurring just in front of their residence, and medical aid summoned, it developing that she had suffered a broken rib and was otherwise considerably bruised. Mrs. Dallas, for a time after the accident, suffered from her injuries and the shock as well. She has been confined to her bed since the accident, but is improving nicely. It was indeed a narrow escape, and her many friends are glad that she was not more severely injured.

Potato Market A Little Up

The potato market is up a little this week, the price on the Kansas City market having gone up 40 cents from Saturday to Tuesday. The season in the potato world has been a very unsatisfactory one. Some cars of spuds brought the producer \$85.00; \$75.00 to \$100, while other cars brought as low returns as \$13.00. One car of which we have learned netted the grower only 32 cents, and a commission house wrote to another producer to "please remit" \$3.00 to finish paying the freight. Do we need a potato growers' association? It's a question the potato men must decide for themselves.
