Colorado County Cotton Crop
Worth \$1,643,232.

The Texas cotton crop for 1912
is the most valuable one in the
history of the cotton industry
according to preliminary esti-
mates furnished the Commer-
cial Secretaries and Business
Men's Association by the Federal
Census Bureau. The Texas
yield in 1912 was 4,880,210 bales
of 500 pounds or 824,000
bales more than the 1911 crop, while
the 1912 yield in the United States
was approximately 3,000,000
bales less than in 1911. The ex-
cessive yield in Texas was absor-
bed by floods, droughts and unfav-
orable conditions in other south-
ern states. The world's con-
sumption of cotton in 1911 is re-
ported by our Census Bureau to be
20,402,000 bales of 500 pounds net
and the 1912 production will,
according to reliable estimates,
fall slightly under these figures.

The 1912 Texas cotton crop was
amputed to 22,397,000 or an over-
production of approximately
2,000,000 bales. The average
price of cotton for 1911 was 9.9
cents per pound and in 1912 the
price was 12.05. The 1912 Texas
crop, including seed, sold for
\$388,535,822 which is an advance
of \$90,958,000 over the 1910, its
nearest competitor.

The effect of over-production
in 1911 made itself manifest in
the price per pound. The 1912
world crop while 2,000,000 bales
under the 1911 production, will,
in all probability, sell for several
million dollars more than the
1911 crop. It will be 60 days be-
fore complete reports on the
world's production and prices
are announced.

There were 23,681 equivalent
500 pound bales of cotton pro-
duced in Colorado county from
the crop of 1912 and the lint and
seed sold for approximately
\$1,643,232. The lint sold for
\$1,456,780 and 11,841 tons of seed
produced in this county brought
\$210,452. Commercial Secre-
taries.
