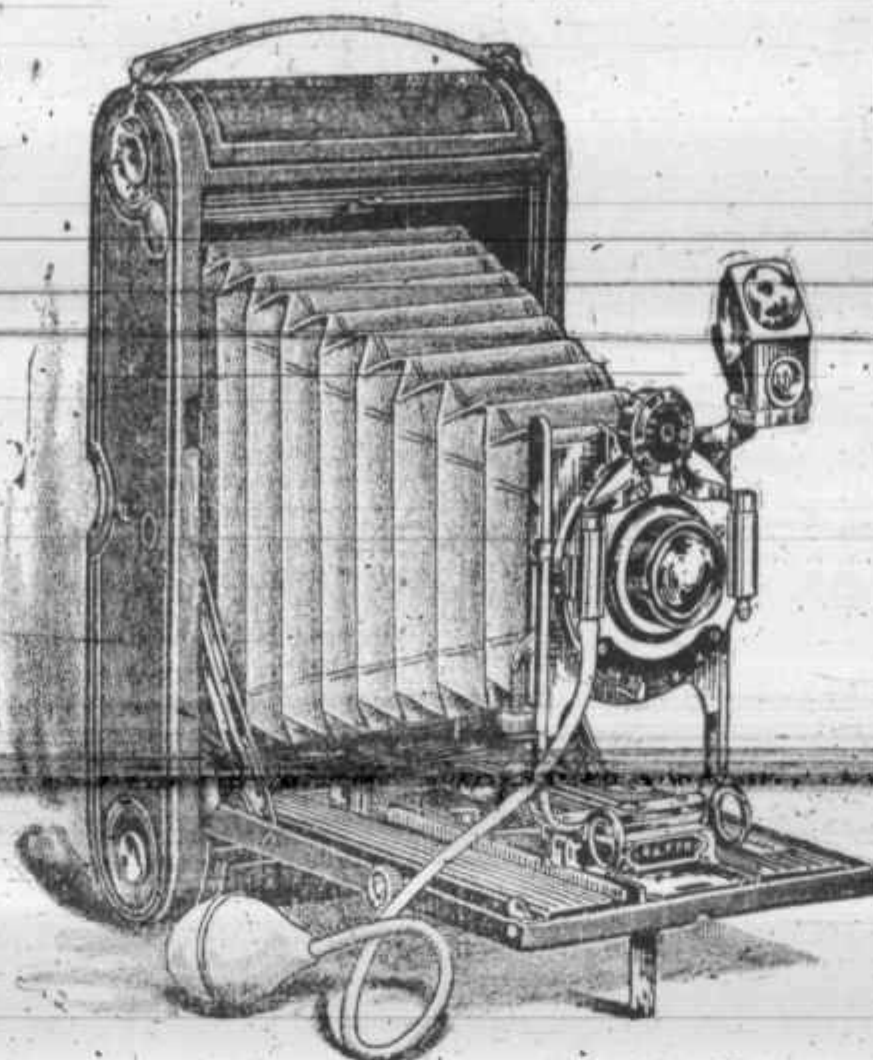

Of Interest to Ginners.

The Thirty-second Legislature enacted a law requiring ginners to mark the bales ginned in a certain way. The Texas Department of Agriculture has made all reasonable efforts to acquaint the ginners with the law. It was expected, as the law was figured by a great many ginners, in fact, by a majority of them, that the law would be repealed. It will be in force during the coming season and we learn it will be enforced.

To the inattentive I will say, you will have no excuse if some officer comes along with an eye to business and hauls you before the court to the tune of \$10 a bale and trimmings amounting to \$24 or \$25 for each bale, or worse still, \$100 per bale, at the pleasure of the court. Each bale constitutes a separate offense.

On Oct. 24, 1912, two prominent ginners each paid a fine of \$24.50 and costs amounting to \$34.50 for turning out one bale not properly marked, in Justice M. M. Johnson's court, in Austin. It would be well for those interested to heed this law when the season starts.

You are required to use indelible ink, the old way of marking with lamp-black or any old stuff won't go. The law was made for the protection of the cotton raiser against the sharks. Others must comply with the laws regulating their business, why not you? Besides, you should take pride in anything that is good for the cotton grower, as he is the source of your bread and meat.—Ginners' Friend, in Austin Statesman.
