Judge Not

If we knew the causes and effects
Knew the things all in vain,
And in the bitter disappointments,
Understood the loss and gain,
Would the grim world roughness
Seem a wonder—just the same?
Should we help where now we hinder?
Should we play where we blame?

One of the greatest faults of
humanity is the forming of opin-
ions too hastily and expressing
them, without due consideration
of the effect they may have. Hu-
man nature is essentially the
same now that it has always
been. Even in the days of the
great Galilean prophet some said
of him, "He is of God," while
others said, "He hath a devil."
Some said he cast out devils by
Beezebub, the prince of devils,
while others said he did it thru
the power of God. This prone-
ness to judge others seems to be
a universal fault, and it is a most
grievous one. The formation of
an opinion as to the character of
men would not of itself be so bad
were it not expressed to others,
which tends in a greater or less
degree to warp their opinions to
an extent quite often the opposite
of what they would otherwise
have been. The great Apostle
who "sat at the feet of Gamaliel"
said "Why dost thou judge thy
brother? . . . Every one of us
shall give an account of himself
to God." The pronouncement of
judgment upon any one without
due investigation is sheer wick-
edness. It comes from a heart
that is not well filled with love
for God and man. As Tupper
says, "God will love thee less be-
cause men love thee more." This
statement is well founded. Word
tells us another truth, "In pro-
portion as we send out love we
receive it." It is logical to con-
clude, then, that he who has the
love of men has manifested love
toward them, and like Abou Ben

Adhem, his name "leads all the
rest." As we therefore have
opportunity, let us do good unto
all men.

When we realize that we are so
often wrong in our opinions of
others, and also that it so fre-
quently happens that offense is
given when none is intended, we
find that the belittling and mini-
mizing of the good traits of others
has little foundation, for then it
is plainly seen that their faults
are really few. Some one has
said that "it is the weakness of
the weak to give offense where
none is merited and to take of-
fense when none is intended."
This sentence is found in a Bud-
dhist rosary: "One may con-
quer a thousand men in battle,
but he who conquers himself
alone is the greatest victor," and
he who conquers the sin of judg-
ing others, their motives and
aims, has won a great victory.

Five things observe with care—
Of what you speak,
To whom you speak,
And how, and when, and where.

It is an awful thing, one most
terrible in its consequences, to
put a bad thought in the place of
a good one, whether in one's own
mind or that of some one else.

"Thoughts are things," and life
is made up of them. How nec-
essary therefore that they be
pure and good, and freighted
with love! "Thoughts that are
pure will without effort fit them-
selves into speech that is pure,"
George McDonald writes:

Things can never go badly wrong
If the heart is true and the love is strong.
And Emerson gives a compan-
ion thought in this:

He that feeds men serveth few;
He serves all who dares be true.

These thoughts are as true as
any fact can be. They are not
susceptible of questioning. Men
are parted from friends of long
standing, even from childhood
friends, by the expressed opin-
ion of one who has known them
probably only a short time, and
and who has had opportunity
to know whereof he speaks. "O
man of God . . . follow after
righteousness, . . . faith, love,
patience, meekness," for "What-
soever is born of God overcometh
the world." Most of the defi-
ciencies of men would be over-
come if they would only take the
time to consider, and to exercise
their consciences in everything.
"Trust no man in anything who
has not a conscience in every-
thing." Kipling in the same
poem from which we quote at the
beginning of this article says:

Could we judge all deeds by motives
That surround each others lives,
See the naked heart and spirit,
Know 'till after the action given,
Often we should find it nobler,
Purer than we judge we should,
And we'd love each other better
If we only understood.

It is a very easy matter to give
advice when we don't know the
circumstances; to pronounce up-
on and judge characters without
knowing the heartaches, the sor-
rows, the influences being
brought to bear, the real motives
of those judged. Men find in
others just what they look for,
and if they are inclined to look
for foibles, faults and frailties
they will find them; if they seek
those things which are good and
true they will likely find them.
The thoughts of their own hearts
judge the thoughts in the hearts
of others. Alice Carey says:

Do not look for wrong and evil
You will find them if you do
As you measure by your neighbor
He will measure back to you.
Look for goodness, look for gladness—
You will meet them all the while!
If you bring a smiling visage
To the glass, you meet a smile.

Improvements at Eagle Lake Man- ufacturing Company

The Headlight man had the
pleasure of being shown through
the Eagle Lake Manufacturing
Company's plant last Saturday
day by Manager A. H. Koen-
necke.

Mr. Koennecke is certainly
getting things in splendid shape
at the plant, and the ice he is
manufacturing is as pure as is
made in the State of Texas, only
pure distilled water, being used
in its manufacture.

The bottling works department
was very interesting to us. Ev-
ery thing in the department is
as neat as a pin. The bottles
are all thoroughly washed by
machinery in flowing water.

The creamery department is
one of the most attractive fea-
tures of the plant, Mr. Koen-
necke having in formed us that
the creamery last month paid out
something over \$2,000 for cream.
This business is rapidly grow-
ing and in a very short time is
going to be one of Eagle Lake's
big industries. Everything in
the creamery is thoroughly san-

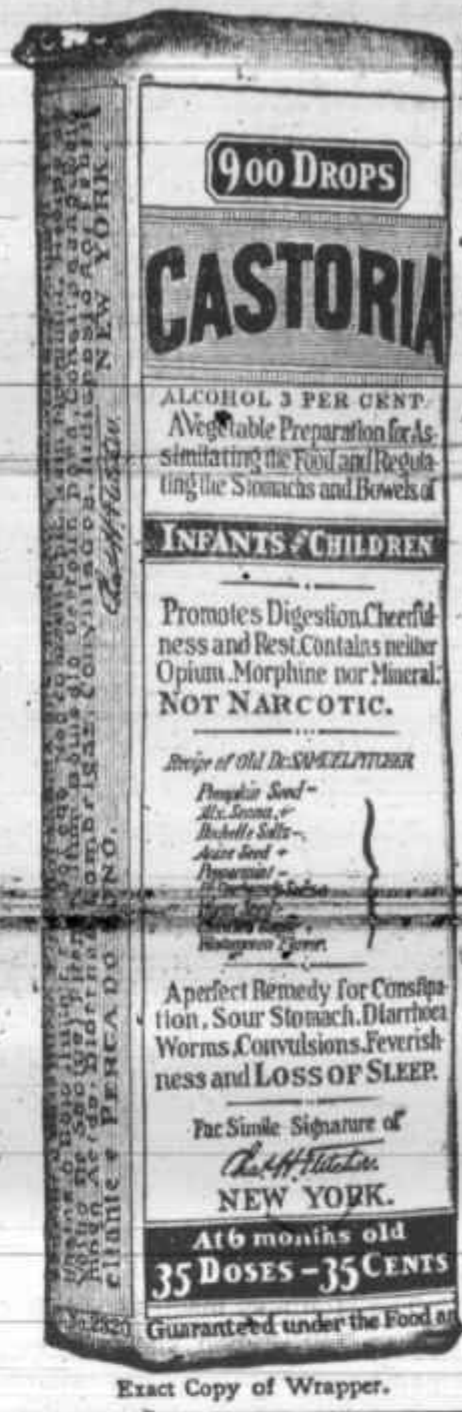
