Radford Again Calls Attention to Our Large Farms.

The average farm in Colorado County contains 168.2 acres and in each farm the average number of acres of improved land is 73.5. The Farmers Union is strongly advocating the reduction of the farms of this state and its President, Hon. Peter Radford, has previously, through the press, called attention to the number of large farms in Colorado County. Federal Census Records show that we have 998 farms that contain more than 100 acres. Mr. Radford claims that if cheap money were available more tenant farmers would become home owners and the owners of these large tracts could be induced to place their property on the market in small tracts.

We now have 2283 farms in this county and 1066 of them are operated by tenants.—Commercial Secretaries.
