Dancing

And by-and-by it shall come to the social reformer that the new dances, more than the old dances, is the cause of immorality, for men and women and girls and boys of all social casts take part in the dance. It is not only the shop girl, at \$3 a week, who "rags" and "tangoes" with her male acquaintances; it is the society girl and the millionaire's daughter as well.

There are few things more beautiful and few exercises more graceful than proper dancing. And in like proportion, there are few things more detrimental to individual modesty than some of the modern dances that have become the accepted fad of the ball room.

A man who is not a preacher, writing in the "Man's World," after declaring that only strong, clean minded people can dance the "hugs" and "tangoes" of the modern dance room and come out unscathed, in his editorial ideal, declares that the "menace for weaker and the ignorant natures is so imminent as to be self-evident. This is how he views these travesties on the beautiful art of Terpsichore:

When I hear the music to the "turkey trot," the "tango," the "grizzly bear" and the "bunny hug," I can see the devil, fiddle in hand. A few years ago the police interdicted stage exhibitions of a less gross character. Today fathers and husbands and brothers "trot" unblushingly in company with mother and daughters and sisters—the spectacle is appalling.

The minuet is stately and exquisite; the waltz is poetry in motion; there is pure rhythm in the schottische and the polka; joy of living in the mazourka and chardish and rollicking fun in the Virginia reel. But the trots and the hugs and the tangoes are heritages from the bagnio—gifts of the brothel.

New York has gone dance-mad. The Broadway restaurants are crowded nightly with "trotters" whose activities continue until the closing hours. Road houses advertise dancing for their patrons, and halls devoted solely to "trotting" and "ragging" are being opened in all quarters.

The seriousness of the situation is intensified by the sale of drinks; and between lascivious music, lustful dancing and liquor, the toll of dishonor is bound to be heavy.

When men take this view of a social fad it is certainly time for mothers and fathers to call a halt and put the ban peremptorily on the offending amusement. In many of the large cities there are movements on foot to have these insidious dances made a violation of a city ordinance, but the place to start the reform is in the homes, and the proper authorities to rule against it are the parents.

The reply made to such a suggestion is that old cry of "to the pure all things are pure." But this a silly begging of the question. It is for the preservation of this moral whiteness that writers like the one quoted are taking up their pens. No one can go on touching pitch and not in time be smudged, even if it be ever so slightly. The best way is not to touch it at all.

It would be a red letter day for the rising generation if society would write over its ball room doors: "Dancing, but no 'ragging' or 'bunny hugging' or 'turkey trotting' allowed." For what high society does, the less fashionable casts will imitate, and the discredited dances would sink back to their disreputable native sources. —Memphis (Tenn.) Commercial Appeal.
