

The Low-Down Dances

Bryan Eagle: The "tango" is said to have originated in the low-est and toughest slums of Buenos Ayres, and yet its seductive sensations have captured the very elect of New York, Paris and other society centers. All of which reminds us of a favorite "copy" our teachers used to set for us way back in the log school-house days: "Man is prone to wander as the sparks fly upward."

Of course the tango and the other "ragtime" dances—all of which are alike in the man—may have originated in bad places or in a bad social era. As a matter of fact, they are not new. They are as old as ragtime itself, which, instead of being new, is as old as the emotional impulses of aboriginal people. With ragtime go rag dances, such as the tango. But among the crude people of old world ages, the Southern blacks in Africa and the East Indians in India, the dances were probably simple expressions of nature and therefore respectable according to the canons of local sentiment. The modern tango, however, has been embroidered by imaginative sensualists who have, some of them, been fitted with a sort of artistic sense which enables them to brocade upon the pattern of the dance a sort of primitive fascination combined with expert performance, and which enthralls many who are not bastioned by rugged regard for conventional ideals. It is this hybrid which perhaps originated in the social cesspool of Buenos Ayres. There perhaps it is performed with the abandon which characterizes thoroughly degenerate and shameless men and women. What Americans see in cabarets and, sometimes, wholly respectable ballrooms is a modification

of the real tango, or its kindred figures. But even the modification is to an innocent bystander a subject of amazement in that he wonders if the perfectly proper men and women who are performing it have any idea of how darned silly they look and how easy a stranger might guess that they are not overly particular as to the company they keep.—Galveston News.

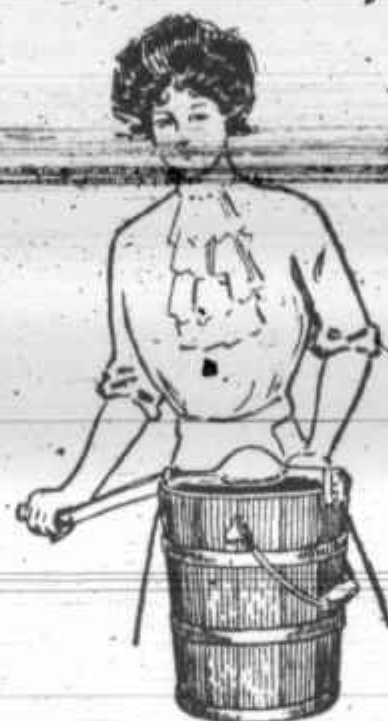

"The first bale of cotton in the Eagle Lake country was raised on the Pecan Valley farm," said M. D. Flowers, at the Macatee Hotel Wednesday. "It weighed 575 pounds. Cotton prospects are pretty good, but cane is a failure this year in our section due to the drouth. We have not had a good rain since March 11. There has been several showers, but they did not amount to much. Although the corn crop can not be said to be a total failure, it will be very short this season. There were several thousand acres of sweet and Irish potatoes planted in the Eagle Lake vicinity, all of which have been practically ruined on account of dry weather. The rice is not good the year, either, it being quite grassy. I understand that it has been dry throughout Colorado and Jackson Counties.—Houston Post.

New Nickels Recalled
Announcement has been made by Secretary McAdoo at Washington that no more of the buffalo nickels are to be put out in the mint and those outstanding, will be gradually called in from circulation. This announcement, which has been predicted by local bankers for some time, will meet with general satisfaction among local banking firms and the public in general, as very few compliments have been heard on the new coin, which as yet have not attained a large general circulation and to some are unknown by sight.

It is understood that the reason the government ordered no more of the nickels coined was owing to the dimness of the "five cents" on the coin.
