The New Game Law

The new game laws passed by the last legislature will considerably effect the shooting in this section of the State. The new law permits ducks and geese to be killed from October 1st to January 16th; rails from September 1st to December 1st; snipe and plover from September 1st to December 16th. As the plover stay in this country from about the middle of August to the first of September, in the fall, and the latter part of March and first of April in the spring, the new law will bring to a close plover shooting as far as this part of the State is concerned. It looks as if some of the game laws were made by people who don't know a plover from a jack rabbit nor a wild duck from an alligator.

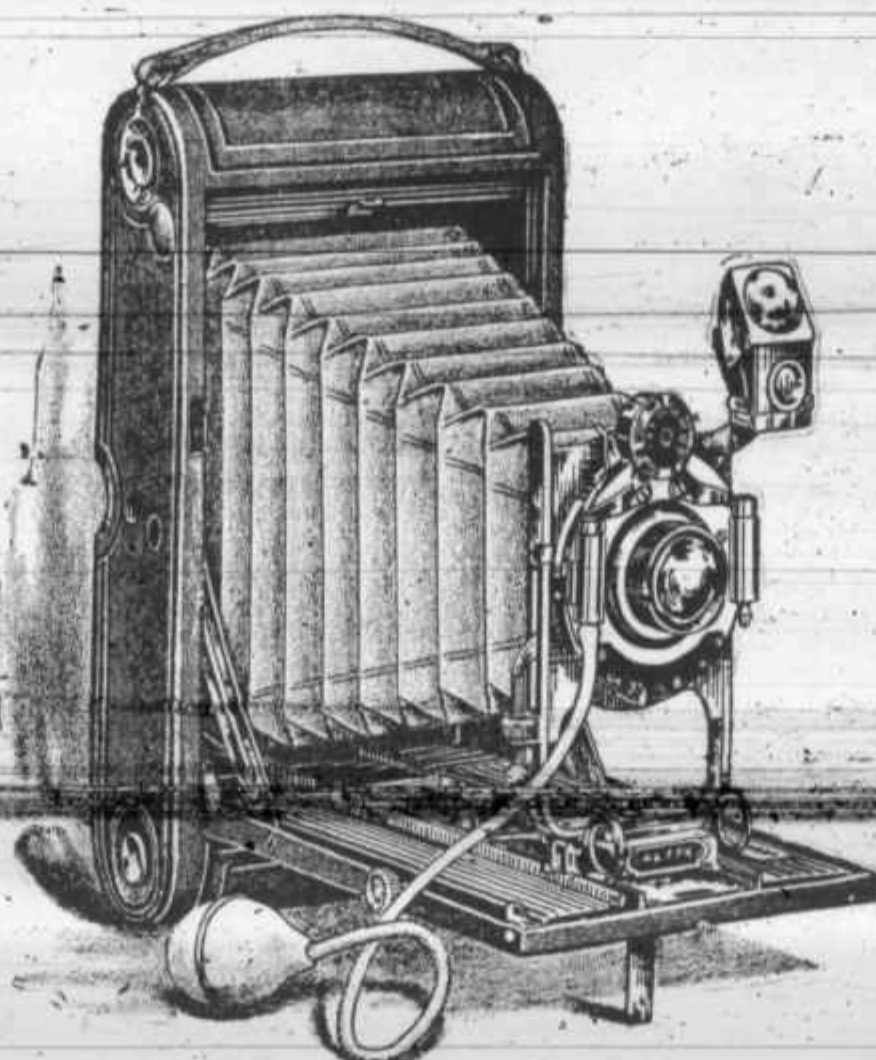
