a heavy hammer. At the same
instant a mosquito stung White
on the nose, causing him to jerk
his head backward. The ham-
mer grazed his face and struck
his foot, hurting him quite pain-
fully. Had the hammer struck
White on the head it may have
crushed his skull. George Gray,
who years ago lived northwest of
Bradford, said that a drink of
whiskey saved his life. George
was on his way from Gray, Ia.,
to Chicago with a train load of
cattle he had fattened for the mar-
ket. At a little town his train
was sidetracked to allow the
passing of a passenger train, and
George, feeling rather unwell, took
a drink of whiskey, which saved
him by, ran over to get a few while
his train waited. While he was
gone another freight train, that
was following, ran in on the
switch and demolished the ca-
boose in which George and the
trainmen had been riding. Af-
terward when George's friends
persuaded him to give up intoxi-
cants he would always say that
whiskey saved his life.—Henry

in an auto.

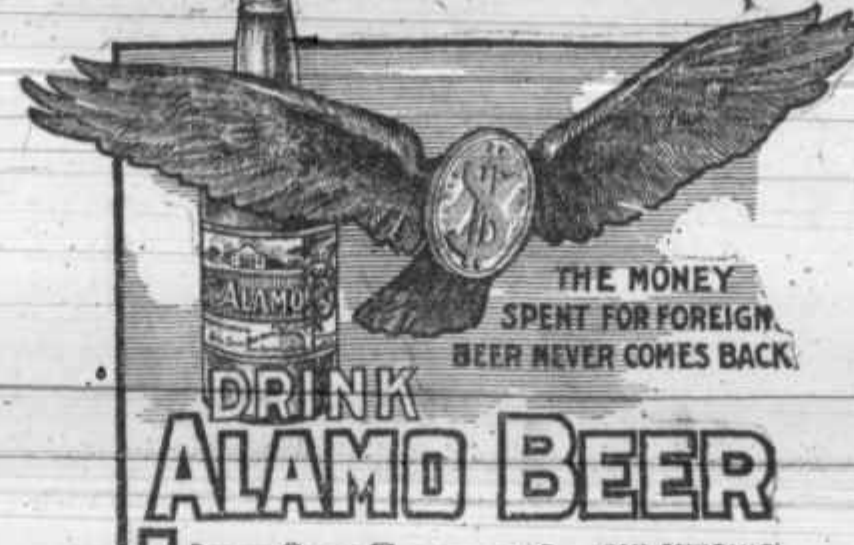
Mr. B. Leysant of Alileyton,
