Solomon Must Have Had a Hard Time

Solomon, although indeed the wealthiest and most luxurious of all the Kings of Israel, never lived as comfortably as the average man of today in a \$50 flat. For many generations the traditions of the splendors of his life have held the fancy of romancers and poets. Workmen were 13 years building his famous palace, called, "The House of the Forest of Lebanon," because of the liberal use of cedar wood in its construction.

It was 150 feet long and 75 feet broad, standing 45 feet high, with four rows of cedar pillars, and cedar beams above the pillars.

It was ceiled with cedar, and there was a porch 75 feet long and 45 feet broad in front of the palace. He had a great "Porch of Judgment," in which stood the great ivory throne, overlaid

up to the throne, and a gold footstool, and 12 lions of molten gold on the steps.

All of Solomon's drinking vessels were of gold, and all the dishes and plates from which he ate—but was he as comfortable as the man of moderate means who lives today in a modern flat in a great city?

It is true that King Solomon had slaves by the hundreds, to wait his beck and call, but all of these could not really give him the ordinary comforts which the modern householder or flat dweller enjoys without any special consideration.

The House of the Forest of Lebanon was very cold when winter came, and though doubtless there were fire places in it, the King might be roasted on one side and almost frozen on the other.

If the King wanted to take a bath it meant heating the water and bringing it up in pails, even though these utensils were gold. He had no such thing as a porce-

lian bath tub in which he merely turned the faucets and had water at the temperature he desired.

Nothing was known of electricity or gas lighting in those days, so all the gorgeous feasts of Solomon when he entertained the Queen of Sheba could be illuminated only by smoky flaring torches, for kerosene and the modern brilliant lamps were unknown in that time. Reading by such light, and from the cumbersome scrolls that served as books in his day, was far from comfortable.

If there was a plague in Jerusalem, the King was ill-protected from illness, for nothing was understood of quarantine, with the exception of leprosy, the lepers being sent out to separate settlement beyond the city limits.

The ordinary man of modest means in our day can know what the world is doing as he glances over his morning paper, buy what he needs, whether it be food and drink, or clothing or jewels, at a moment's notice, keep warm, be clean and healthy—and all without any great effort on his part. All is ready at hand, and he has comforts of which Solomon, with all his far famed wisdom, could not dream.—New York American.
