Election Order

Be it ordered by the board of trustees of the Eagle Lake Independent School District that an election be held at the Band Stand in the Public Park in the town of Eagle Lake in the county of De Witt, Texas, on the 27th day of August, 1913, to determine whether the board of trustees of said district shall have power to annually levy and collect a tax upon all taxable property in said district for the support and maintenance of public free schools in said Eagle Lake Independent School District, of and at the rate of not exceeding fifty cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property in the district; such tax if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1913 and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

J. R. Westmoreland is hereby appointed manager of said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same.

None but property tax payers who are qualified voters in said Eagle Lake Independent School District, shall vote at said election. A copy of this order signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board shall serve as proper notice of said election, and the president shall cause notice of said election to be given in accordance with law. Witness my hand and the seal of the said district this 21st day of July, 1913.

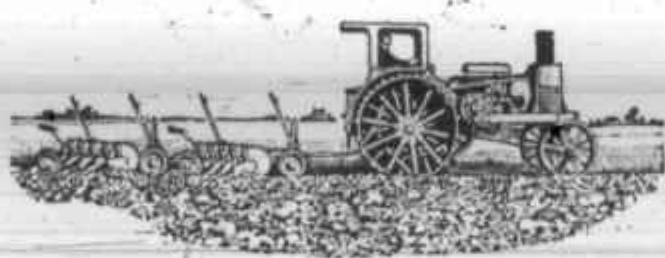

NO SCHOOL TAX ELECTION WAS HELD

Injunction Granted by Judge Kennon Restraining Trustees From Holding School Tax Election For Eagle Lake School District.

An injunction to prevent the holding of the school tax election for the Eagle Lake Independent School District was issued by Judge Kennon and filed with the Clerk of said court a bond in the sum of \$1000.00, made payable and conditioned as required by law and fiat of the Judge.

You are hereby commanded that you, and each of you, your agents, servants and attorneys, and all other persons desist and refrain from holding said election, or from doing anything or any act looking thereto or in furtherance thereof, until the further order of said District Court, to be held within and for the county of Colorado, at the court house thereof in Columbus on the second Monday of September, A. D., 1913, the same being the 5th day of September, A. D., 1913, when and where this writ is returnable.

HISTORY OF THE CASE.

On August 25, 1913, Frank Martin, L. J. Edwards, Walter Adams, W. S. Campbell, August Johnson, A. E. Deats, Charles Banning, W. W. McCormick, V. A. Hayden, T. W. Martin, Oliver Martin, and M. B. Briggs filed their petition in the District Court of Colorado county on the 25th day of August, A. D., 1913 in a suit numbered 7925 on the docket of said Court, wherein Frank Martin, L. J. Edwards, Walter Adams, W. S. Campbell, August Johnson, A. E. Deats, Charles Banning, W. W. McCormick, V. A. Hayden, T. W. Martin, Oliver Martin, and M. B. Briggs are Plaintiffs, and the city of Eagle Lake, the Eagle Lake Independent School District, E. L. Mooney, M. E. Gynn, J. F. Fordyce, P. T. Gordon, E. W. Hanly, S. O. McCarty, F. S. Uery and J. R. Westmoreland are Defendants, alleging that the Board of Trustees of the Eagle Lake Independent School District made an order or proclamation calling an election to be held in the city of Eagle Lake on the 27th day of August, A. D., 1913, to empower said Trustees to annually levy and collect a tax upon all taxable property in said Eagle Lake Independent School District for the support of maintenance of the public free schools in said Eagle Lake Independent School District, of and at a rate of not exceeding fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in said district, and that J. R. Westmoreland was appointed manager of said election, with authority to select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same, and, in furtherance of which, said Westmoreland is proceeding and threatening to carry out said order and to hold said election, and to appoint said judges and clerks to assist in so doing, and which he and those acting with him and said Board of Trustees will do unless restrained by an order of this Court; and praying for a temporary injunction restraining you and each of you, your agents, servants, and appointees, and all other persons from holding said election, or from doing anything, or any act looking thereto in furtherance thereof, and which plaintiffs ask may be made final upon the hearing of said petition.

And whereas, the Honorable Munford Kennon, Judge of said court, has made upon said petition his order and fiat as follows: In chambers, Columbus, Texas, August 23rd, A. D., 1913, the Clerk of the District Court of Colorado county, Texas, will file the within application, and upon the execution of an injunction bond in the sum of \$1000.00, payable and conditioned as the law requires, is directed to issue the temporary writ of injunction prayed for in the within petition, which petition is made a part of this order.

This application this day presented to me is respectfully refused, because notwithstanding the fact that the equity of the case appears to be with the applicants (Trustees and others), I do not think that I have the jurisdiction or authority under the constitution and statutes of

You are hereby commanded that you, and each of you, your agents, servants and attorneys, and all other persons desist and refrain from holding said election, or from doing anything or any act looking thereto or in furtherance thereof, until the further order of said District Court, to be held within and for the county of Colorado, at the court house thereof in Columbus on the second Monday of September, A. D., 1913, the same being the 5th day of September, A. D., 1913, when and where this writ is returnable.
