Synopsis of Commissioners' Court Proceedings, August Term.

It was ordered that 100 acres be added to the delinquency of the Ransom Weed Survey Abstract No. 598 for the year 1908, and credited to the Jos. Waples Survey Abstract No. 592 for the said year 1908.

It came to the knowledge of the court that Mr. F. P. Herbert had recently obstructed the Eagle Lake and Colorado river public road No. 141, by erecting a fence thereon east of what is known as the John Newburn tract and east of the Thornton Morton tract on the Cartwright League, and that said obstruction seriously impairs the same.

It was therefore ordered that the said F. P. Herbert be requested to remove said obstruction within ten days from date of receiving notice from the clerk of this court.

County Attorney A. A. Gregory was ordered to proceed at once to file suits in the District court of Colorado county, Texas, to foreclose the tax lien upon all lands as reported delinquent for former years and not redeemed and also delinquent for the year 1912, as reported by the tax collector of Colorado county, Texas, as provided by law.

The court examined the quarterly report of H. Braden, Tax Collector of Colorado county, Texas, made by him as such officer, of county taxes collected by him during the quarter ending May, 1913, which report being checked by the court and found to be correct, and same was approved.

The court examined the quarterly report of County Clerk John Hastedt, of the condition of the finance ledger which was approved.

The sum of \$1000.00 was transferred from the jury fund to the road and bridge fund.

You are hereby commanded to summon M. L. Calhoun and Mrs. M. L. Calhoun by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks next previous to the return day hereof, in the Eagle Lake Headlight, a newspaper published in Colorado County, Texas, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Colorado County, to be held at the Court House thereof, in Columbus, Texas, on the 2nd Monday in September, A. D. 1913, the same being the 8th day of September, A. D. 1913, then and there to answer Plaintiff's First Amended Original Petition filed in said Court on the 6th day of August, A. D. 1913, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 4847, wherein E. M. Neill, a feme sole, Sallie R. Rosenfield, N. Rosenfield, Phoebe J. Wirtz, J. G. Wirtz are plaintiffs, and Mrs. M. L. Calhoun, M. L. Calhoun, R. C. Hollingsworth and Jas. B. Hollingsworth are defendants, and said petition alleging that:

Plaintiffs and defendants are joint owners in fee simple of the following described land and premises situated in Colorado County, Texas, to-wit:

A certain tract or parcel of land out of a 2284 acre tract of land out of the N. G. Hams league in Colorado County, Texas, described by metes and bounds as follows: Beginning at a stake in the E. boundary line of the Clapp Survey, at a point where the division line between Hollingsworth and Hunt intersects said line, from which a live oak marked T. bears N. 41° E. 6 vrs., live oak marked X bears N. 60 W. 12 vrs., running thence N. with said Clapp line 4284-10 vrs., to rock in Holscher's S. W. corner; thence East with Holscher's S. line, 557-1-10 vrs., stake in said line, thence S. 83° 4-10 vrs., stake in said division line from which live oak marked T. bears N. 41° E. 6 vrs., thence with said division line to the place of beginning, containing 91 acres of land, being the same land described in a deed from M. J. Hollingsworth, et al. to Wm. Neill is entitled to one equal undivided one-eighth part of the first described tract of land, and an undivided one-fifth part of the second described tract; the plaintiff Sallie R. Rosenfield and her husband, N. Rosenfield, are entitled to an undivided one-eighth part of the first described tract, and an undivided one-fifth part of the second described tract; the plaintiff, Phoebe J. Wirtz, and her husband, J. G. Wirtz, are entitled to one equal undivided one-eighth part of the first described tract of land, and an undivided one-fifth part of the second described tract; that the defendants, Mrs. M. L. Calhoun and her husband, are entitled to an undivided one-half of the first described tract of land, and an undivided one-fifth of the second described tract. That the plaintiffs and defendants are the owners of said land and premises as far as is known to plaintiffs, and the estimated value thereof is \$25.00 per acre for the first tract and \$10.00 per acre for the second tract, or a total valuation of \$275.00 for all of the property.

That the defendants, Mrs. M. L. Calhoun and husband, have collected rents and revenues from said property of the value of \$2000.00, and have converted

and appropriated the same to their own use and benefit, to the plaintiffs' damage in their proportionate amount thereof.

The said property is divided into farm, pasture and wood-land and has improvements situated thereon in such shape as that a fair and equitable division thereof cannot be made.

Plaintiffs pray for citation, for judgment against defendants, Mrs. M. L. Calhoun and husband, for their rents and revenues collected as above alleged, with legal interest thereon; judgment for the partition and division of said land and premises, that same be ordered sold and the proceeds divided among the parties as their interests may appear; and, in the alternative, if the court is of the opinion that a fair and equitable division of the real estate can be made, that commissioners be appointed and a writ of partition issue, and for possession of that portion that by judgment of the court may be ascertained and declared to be the property of plaintiff, for costs and expenses incurred and awarded.
