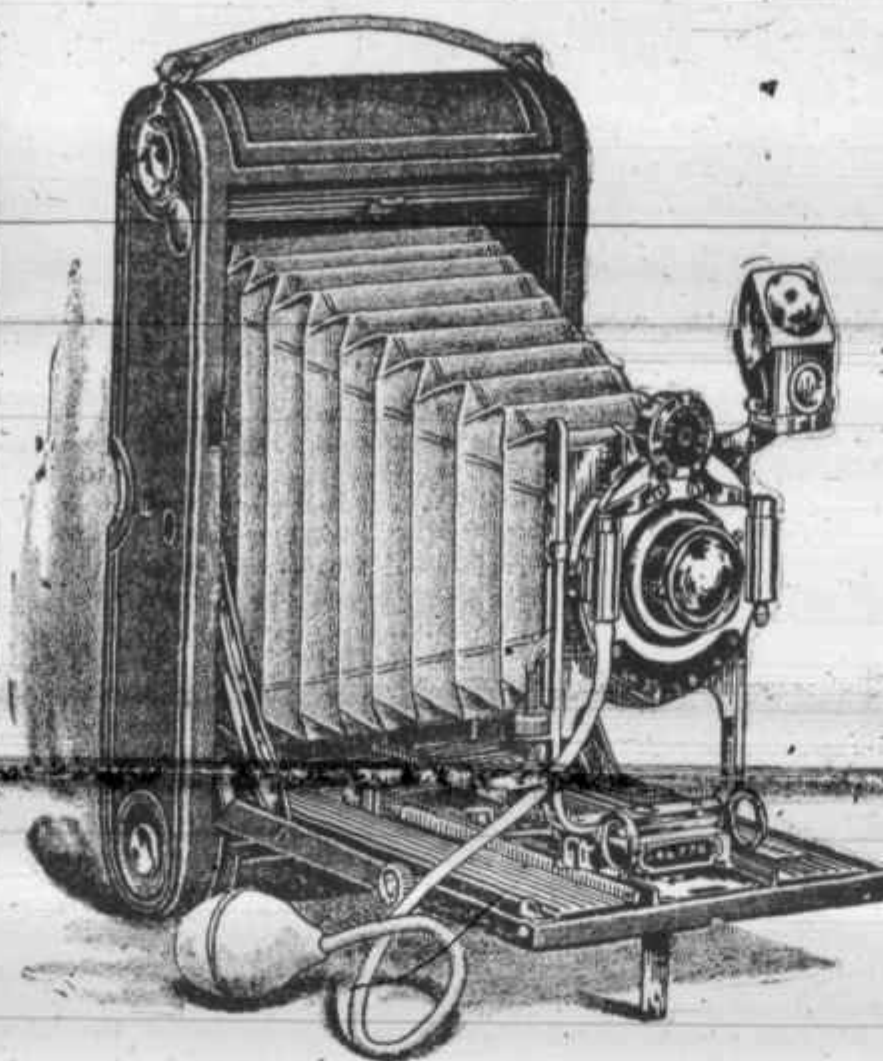

Export Excess Rice to Uphold Market.

Beaumont, Tex., July 30.—Directors of the Southern Rice Growers' Association and representatives of practically every rice mill in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas today agreed on a new basis for exporting 1,500,000 bags more than the domestic trade will consume. A committee from the Rice Growers' Association and one from the rice millers has been named to work out the details of the new plan and these committees will meet here until the matter is closed.

The basis for the new deal as agreed on after an all-day session of millers and growers, contains the following salient points:

The rice mills agree to purchase the entire amount of the export deal from the farmers and will give a bond that it will be paid for the export rice are: Honduras No. 1, \$2.50, Japan \$2.30; Honduras No. 2, \$2.30, Japan \$2; Honduras No. 3, \$2.10, Japan \$1.80; Honduras No. 4, \$1.90, Japan \$1.60.

The rice growers agree to secure contracts from the farmers under the terms of which each grower is to deliver 20 per cent of his crop to the mills at the price named.

The rice is to be paid for on being weighed and the 20 per cent will be taken from each lot as thrashed.

The rice growers probably will place a representative at ship side to check the amount exported to insure compliance with the agreement. The details of the matter in which the millers will make the bond have not been decided. Either each miller will make a bond or one bond will be made to cover the entire transaction and each miller will subscribe to it.

The mass of detail of grading, shipping, division of the rice among the mills and division of the overhead expense of making the sale in Europe and other matters will be worked out by the joint committee of growers and millers.

The plan for exporting appears to have met general approval of millers and growers and it is believed the farmers will readily agree to it and promptly sign the contract. It means that the farmer will get \$2.50 cash for 20 per cent of his crop and for the remainder he will get the average market price of from \$3 to \$3.50. If the rice were not exported, it has been generally agreed, the market price this year would drop below \$2 and perhaps lower.

The first plan devised for exporting and which was abandoned yesterday provided that the Louisiana state would take the rice intended for export, make a payment thereon, mill and export it for 45c a bag and afterward pro rate among the farmers contributing to the deal whatever there was left above what had already been paid. The Rice Growers' Association will waive the commission of 7 1/2c per sack on all rice handled for export.

The committee from the Rice Growers' Association to work out the details is composed of H. G. Chalkley, Lake Charles, La.; J. Louis Ducharme, Carlisle, Ark.; E. A. Eignus, Eagle Lake, Tex.; W. W. Dusen, Bay City, Tex.; and L. E. Robinson of Crowley, La.

The committee from the millers is composed of J. E. Broussard, Beaumont; W. P. H. McFadden, Beaumont; and Gordon S. Orme of New Orleans.

Under the new deal the representative of the Southern Rice Growers' Association now in Europe will be recalled. Frank Godchaux of the Louisiana state who is also in Europe, will likely remain there in the interest of the millers, but the growers now will have nothing to do with finding a purchaser for the rice in Europe.
