Result of Night's Alligator Hunt on Eagle Lake.



The above picture is that of a
open night's bag in alligators. On
last Saturday night Messrs.
John Lafenburg and Tim Tilson,
hunting with headlights on the
lake, killed twenty-six alligators,
ranging in length from six to
nine feet. The alligators were
raised with block and tackles and
the above picture made by Photo-
grapher Harrington. A few
days ago Mr. Lafenburg killed

the largest alligator that has
been seen in the lake this season,
which measured thirteen feet
and eight inches from the tip of
the nose to the tip of the tail.
Messrs. Lafenburg and Tilson
have been hunting alligators of
late for the pastime, but they
have been having the animals
skinned, their hides salted down
and same will be sold as soon as
they can get in touch with a firm

in the market for alligator hides.
The people shown in the picture
above are, 1. Tim Tilson, 2. Al-
bert Clayton, colored, 3. Byars
Welhausen, 4. Zeke McCarty,
colored, 5. John Lafenburg, 6.
Bryant Harrington. The two col-
ored men skinned the alligators.
These gators were killed by Mes-
srs. Tilson and Lafenburg with
high power rifles and the
"string" of twenty-six is consid-
ered a pretty good bag for one
night.

Some Dry in Eagle Lake.

This is the kind of dryness
they had in a portion of Western
Kansas a couple of years ago:
"It is so dry here that wagons
are going around with their
tongues out. Ice has to be soaked
in water all night before it is wet
enough to make lemonade. The
catfish kick up such a dust in the
ponds that the river has to be
sprinkled before you
can go fishing. A spark from
an engine set fire to a pond and

burned up a lot of bullfrogs be-
fore the fire could be extinguish-
ed, and the ground is so hard and
dry that crawfish holes in low
places are being pulled and used
for gas pipes."

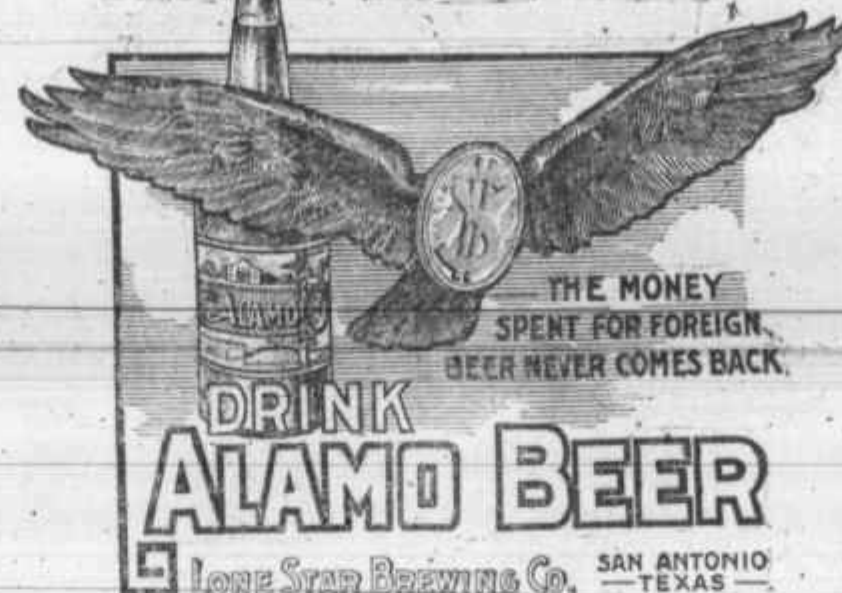
