Carey Shaw Gives Details of Swindle in Terre Haute; Chas. H. Morton is Indicted.

Terre Haute, Ind., Sept. 4.—The testimony of Carey Shaw, a retired banker of Houston, Texas, before the Vigo county grand jury late yesterday afternoon secured the indictment of Charles H. Morton, alias "Clappy" Moran, of London, England, on the charge of grand larceny.

Shaw said Moran, who posed as an English nobleman, and a gang of confederates swindled him out of \$7000 on August 8 in the Terre Haute House.

Detectives claim that the three men who are under arrest in connection with this case are members of a land swindlers' association that for the past three years has been operating in various sections of this country and Europe.

Shaw tells an interesting story regarding the manner in which he was separated from his money. He says that early in the morning of August 8, he was introduced to him in Houston by a brother Mason. Shortly afterward this new friend confided in him that he had an opportunity to put through a deal for 20,000 acres of land in Missouri and that he had a purchaser at an advance of \$3 an acre.

Wallace, according to Shaw, then told him that a syndicate of capitalists in Terre Haute was being formed to handle the deal and that one or two more were needed.

Shaw finally came to Terre Haute with Wallace. On his arrival at the Terre Haute House Shaw says that he met about a dozen "capitalists." The details of the proposition were gone over and Shaw was induced to make an investment of \$7000.

Shaw was told to go to St. Louis with one of the members, where the stock certificates were to be made out and distributed to the members of the company. Shaw says that while on the way to St. Louis his companion vanished. When he reached St. Louis and could not find the office of the company he realized he had been swindled and returned to Terre Haute, but he could
