ELECTION ORDER

Be it ordered by the board of trustees of the Eagle Lake Independent School District, that an election be held at the Band Stand in the Public Park in the town of Eagle Lake in the said Eagle Lake Independent School District on the 29th day of September, 1913, to determine whether the board of trustees of the said district shall have power to annually levy and collect a tax upon all taxable property in said district, for the support and maintenance of public schools in said Eagle Lake Independent School District, of and at the rate of not exceeding fifty cents on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property in the district; such tax, if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1913 and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

G. E. Boothe is hereby appointed manager of said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same.

None but property tax payers who are qualified voters in said Eagle Lake Independent School District, shall vote at said election.

A copy of this order signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board shall serve as proper notice of said election, and the president shall cause notice of said election to be given in accordance with law.

ANOTHER INJUNCTION OUT

Judge Grants Second Injunction Restraining the Board From Holding School Election.

Another injunction has been issued restraining the school board from holding the school tax election. After the injunction was granted preventing the school board from holding the election here the last of the month, to determine whether or not a tax shall be levied and collected in the school district for school purposes the board immediately ordered

the city park here, for the same purpose, on the twenty-ninth day of September. The injunction gotten out this week and granted by Judge Kennon, restrains the school board from holding this election, "and all future election."

The second injunction, so we are told, is practically the same as the first, with the exception that it is made returnable to the February, 1914, term of court. Another exception to the former injunction, so we are informed, is that it is signed by two men less than the former one, the names of L. J. Edwards and A. E. Deats not appearing in the second injunction. The attorneys for the school board, Judge Mansfield of Columbus, Judge Woods of Seguin and A. J. Wirtz of this city, have filed a motion to have the two injunctions consolidated so as one hearing will decide both. We learn that Judge Kennon has consented to give both sides a hearing in this instance, which will likely come up for a hearing before him in Columbus next Thursday, at which time the injunction question, in both instances, will be decided. This is a very grave matter concerning Eagle Lake's school—the one thing that is the pride of our town and the town's greatest drawing card. In the present muddle the school is in a bad fix. Something should be done to overcome these troubles the school board is having, and it is hoped that the matter will be settled when it comes on for a hearing.

WILL ERECT FINE NEW HOME IN EAGLE LAKE.

The family of Mr. S. J. McClung will arrive here from Fayette, West Virginia, about the latter part of this month to join Mr. McClung and make their home here. He this week purchased a building lot from the T. J. Roberts estate, near the public school building and opposite the residence of Mr. E. L. Mooney. Mr. McClung will build a home on this lot, but just when he will begin he is not now in a position to say as, he stated, he wanted to wait until after the arrival of his family, so they could decide at their leisure just what kind of a home they wanted. "I do not know whether I will build before the first of the year or not," said Mr. McClung, "but when I do build I expect to build a good home."

Good rains have fallen the past week over most of the Eagle Lake potato section. The acreage planted to fall potatoes is estimated at one fifth of that planted in the spring, and it is hoped the growing season, and the selling price, will both be considerably improved over the spring crop.

COLUMBUS SEES THINGS

People of Columbus Slight Air Ship in the Night Flying Near That Place.

Columbus, Texas, September 6.—Is there a night-riding aviator hovering over Texas during the hours between dusk and dawn? John Burt, a well-known contractor, reports that he saw what appeared to be a large dirigible balloon or aeroplane from his camp nine miles north of Columbus at Lorib Lorine switch on the LaGrange branch of the Galveston and Houston Railway.

Railway Wednesday night at about 10:40 p. m.

John Burt is a contractor, engaged in furnishing gravel for the railway. With the prospect of having invidious comments made about him Mr. Burt maintains that the following account is true. He relates that while lying awake in one of the bunk cars at 10:40 last Wednesday night he heard a rumbling or a roaring noise which he supposed to be a motor track car. He believed some of his pit workmen were stealing his car out to take a joy ride. He and members of his family ran out quickly to apprehend the probable joy riders, but he soon found his motor car and could see nothing of any other car down the track. At that time Frank Kleinworth called his attention to the noise in the air. On looking up he saw what must have been an aeroplane or dirigible balloon with a red light in front and a green light at the rear. The craft was travelling from the east to the west. He will not approximate its height but will guess at 1500 feet. After watching it a moment he went into the bunk car and awakened his son, Leroy, 16 years of age, who viewed it several minutes. He estimates that the lights were in sight and the noise in hearing between five and ten minutes. Those who vouch for the truth of this are John Burt, James Burt, a son Leroy Burt, a son Joe Burt, a brother and Frank Kleinworth.

Brownsville, Tex., Sept. 7.—Captain Wallace Reed of the life saving station on Brazos Island reports that Thursday night a large air craft was seen hovering over Brazos Island, that the machine was seen coming from the direction of Mexico by the look-out and after hovering over the island for some time disappeared inland on the American side.

SAYS POTATO PLANTERS WELL-DIVERSIFY CROPS.

Mr. J. M. Terrell, who is extensively engaged in farming potatoes, stated this week that his firm next year will plant a considerable acreage to cotton and corn, and not depend altogether on potatoes. Many of the potato farmers, Mr. Terrell stated, are going to diversify to some extent another season. "To my mind," said Mr. Terrell, "the spud crop is yet the best crop grown, but the poor season and poor yield of this spring proves conclusively that we should not depend entirely upon the one crop, potatoes."

IS ASSOCIATION MANAGER

E. A. Eignus is Made General Manager of the Southern Rice Growers' Ass'n.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Southern Rice Growers' Association at Beaumont Tuesday Dr. A. C. Wilkins tendered his resignation. General Manager E. A. Eignus of Eagle Lake was elected to the place after the resignation of Dr. Wilkins was accepted.

The board was in session throughout the day and until about 11:30 p. m. and little could be gathered concerning the circumstances of Dr. Wilkins' resignation, further than the fact that he had resigned, which was given out by W. B. Dunlap, president.

Dr. Wilkins has been manager of the association since its organization three years ago. He has had a free hand in the management, and there was a well defined movement antagonistic to his management developed at the annual meeting of stockholders held in Beaumont in July, but he mustered a majority and was elected to the directorate and again chosen manager by the directors. The milling movement, by which it was proposed to organize a \$2,000,000 association to own mills, and thus give the farmer control of his rice from the field to the consumer, was the wedge which developed a division among the farmers.

The Headlight congratulates Mr. Eignus on his deserved and high promotion. There is not a better rice man in Texas than Mr. Eignus nor a harder and more faithful worker for the association. Mr. Eignus is very popular in this section, not only with the rice men, but with men in all lines of business. The only objection we find to Mr. Eignus' appointment is that it will take him and his estimable wife away from Eagle Lake, and we regret to lose them.

The resignation of General Sales Manager J. J. Garvey having been accepted several weeks ago, his place was filled by Mr. John A. Guynn of Eagle Lake, who is this year stationed at Bay City for the association. Mr. Guynn was in the city yesterday but at this time had not accepted the position and may not do so. Yesterday when he was here he was still undecided as to his future arrangements.

MR. KEITH REPAIRING HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

The contract for the repairing of the high school building was this week let by the school board to Contractor G. W. Keith, he having already begun work on the job. The contractor's price is ten per cent commission on the actual cost of the job. Mr. Keith will complete the job by September 22nd, at which time the teachers' institute will be begun, the school beginning the following Monday, September 23rd. A practically new foundation is being put under the building and reinforcements being made to support the roof of the building.
